1. May 21, 2019, Special Youth Council Meeting Minutes

Mr. Konczal presented the May 21, 2019, meeting minutes for correction and/or approval.

VIICICH/BARNES – APPROVED THE MAY 21, 2019, SPECIAL YOUTH COUNCIL MEETING MINUTES (UNANIMOUS).

2. Fresno Regional Workforce Development Board Outstanding Achievement Awards

Phyllis Stogbauer, Deputy Director of Program Services, FRWDB, presented a short video clip showcasing that the Outstanding Achievement Award for the Second Quarter of PY 2019-2020 was awarded to Matthew Zuniga.

Council Member Martindale arrived (4:04 p.m.)

After completing two (2) semesters of the Manufacturing Program at Reedley College and two (2) work experience contracts, Mr. Zuniga obtained employment at Cencal CNC Inc. as a Computer Numerical Control (CNC) Operator. Fernanda Mendoza, Academic Career Advisor (ACA), Proteus Inc., nominated Mr. Zuniga for continuing with his education to get a career, and having the drive and determination to obtain his certification as a Machinist despite various barriers.

3. Fourth Quarter Local Performance Results Report for Program Year 2018-2019

Ms. Stogbauer presented the Fourth Quarter Local Performance Results for PY 2018-2019 for the Council's recommendation to the FRWDB.

Ms. Stogbauer reviewed the Youth Served, Youth Expenditures, Youth Placement, and Certificate of Attainment graphs.

Director Barnes asked if the percentage of the Youth Certificate Attainment for West Hills Community College District (WHCCD) was particularly low. Ms. Stogbauer responded that it was low, but WHCCD recently changed their staff from part-time to full-time and that should help with managing their program going forward.

Council Member Watson asked if the goals for the reports would ever be increased. Ms. Stogbauer responded that the goals are negotiated with the State of California every couple of years, and it could either go up or down based on different factors for the area.

Stephen DeWitt, Quality Systems Manager, FRWDB, presented the Fourth Quarter Youth Satisfaction Reports for PY 2018-2019 for the Council's recommendation to the FRWDB. Mr. DeWitt indicated that the surveys showed a 97.6% response rate.

6. First Quarter Youth Satisfaction Report for Program Year 2019-2020

Mr. DeWitt presented the First Quarter Youth Satisfaction Reports for PY 2019-2020 for the Council's recommendation to the FRWDB.

Council Member Vuicich asked how the feedback is provided for the satisfaction reports. Mr. DeWitt responded that youth participants that have been identified for closure are contacted by their ACA and are given the five (5) questions to respond to, as well as the opportunity to provide comments.

The auditors all came back with glowing reports for FRWDB staff as well as the providers. Mr. DeWitt added that Fresno is known as a training ground for new state auditors.

RECOMMENDATION:

Recommend that the Fresno Regional Workforce Development Board (FRWDB) accept the Second Quarter Workforce Innovation and Opportunity Act (WIOA) Youth Participant Work Experience Report for Program Year (PY) 2019-2020.

REASON FOR RECOMMENDATION:

The WIOA places a priority on providing youth with occupational learning opportunities through work experience. These work experiences include: paid work experience, pre-apprenticeship programs, job shadowing, and on-the-job training activities. Beginning July 1, 2015, local boards were required to begin implementing new Work Experience requirements, which included a mandated minimum expenditure requirement of 20%.

The WIOA formula funding has a two (2) year life cycle, and local areas are mandated to fully expend the required Work Experience funding by June 30th of the last program year, e.g., Work Experience funds allocated in PY 2017-2018 were required to be fully expended by June 30, 2019. The total Work Experience allocation for PY 2018-2019 was \$997,704.54. Final total expenditures as of December 31, 2019, were 997,704.54. This was 20% of the total allocation and met the mandated expenditure requirement.

Total allocations for PY 2019-2020 is \$1,106,526, which must be expended by June 30, 2021. The following table provides work experience allocations and year-to-date expenditures by provider through December 31, 2019.

Each Provider will present a performance report at the meeting.

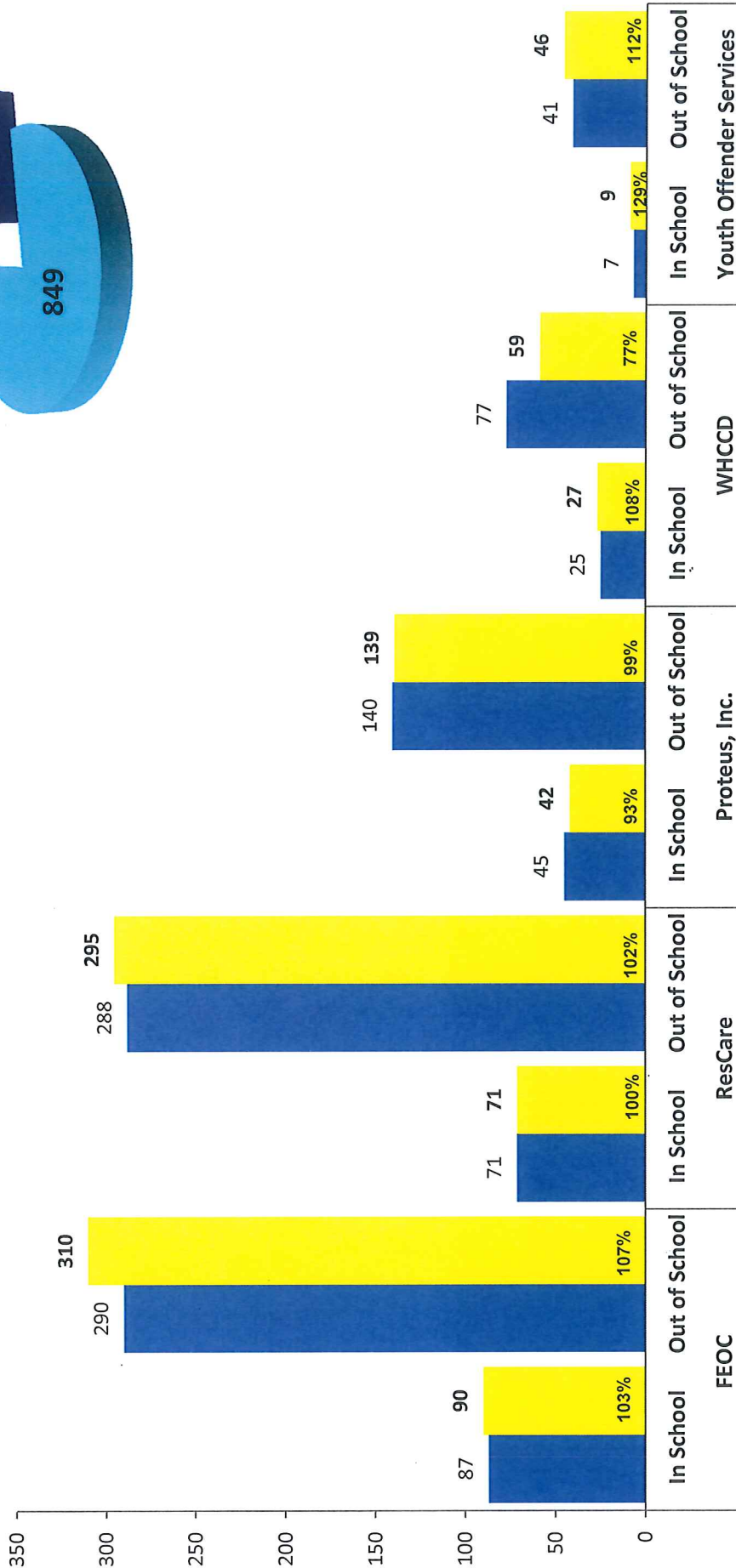
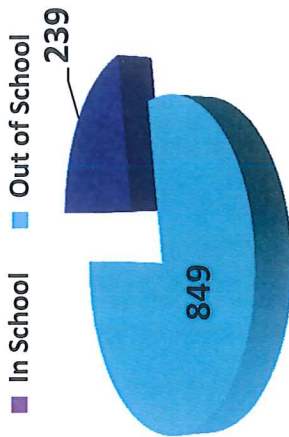

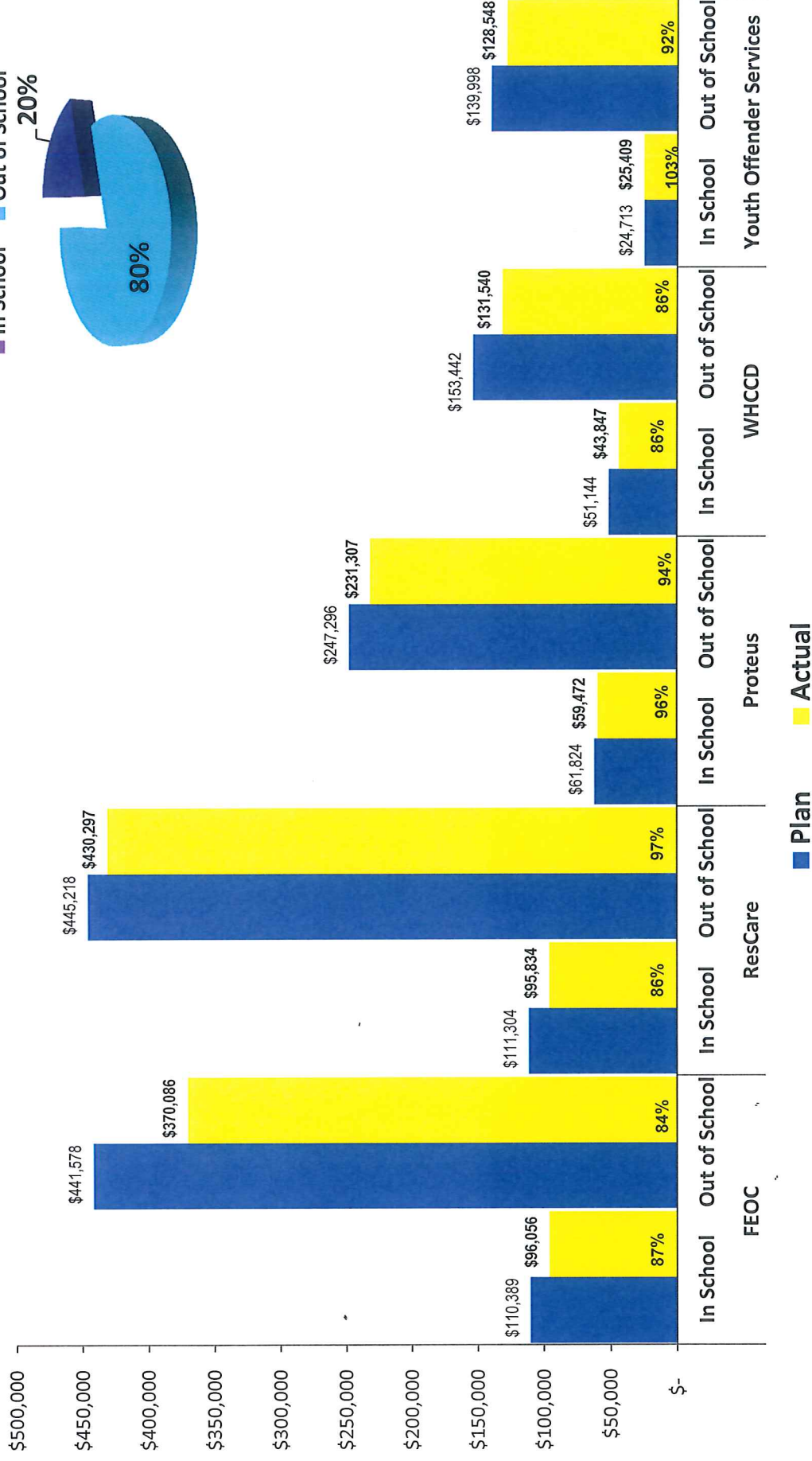
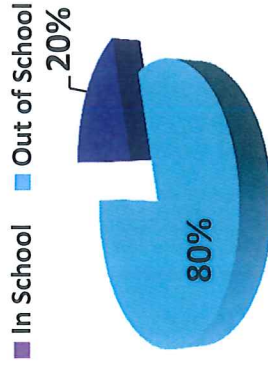
Total Served- 1088

Total Expenditures

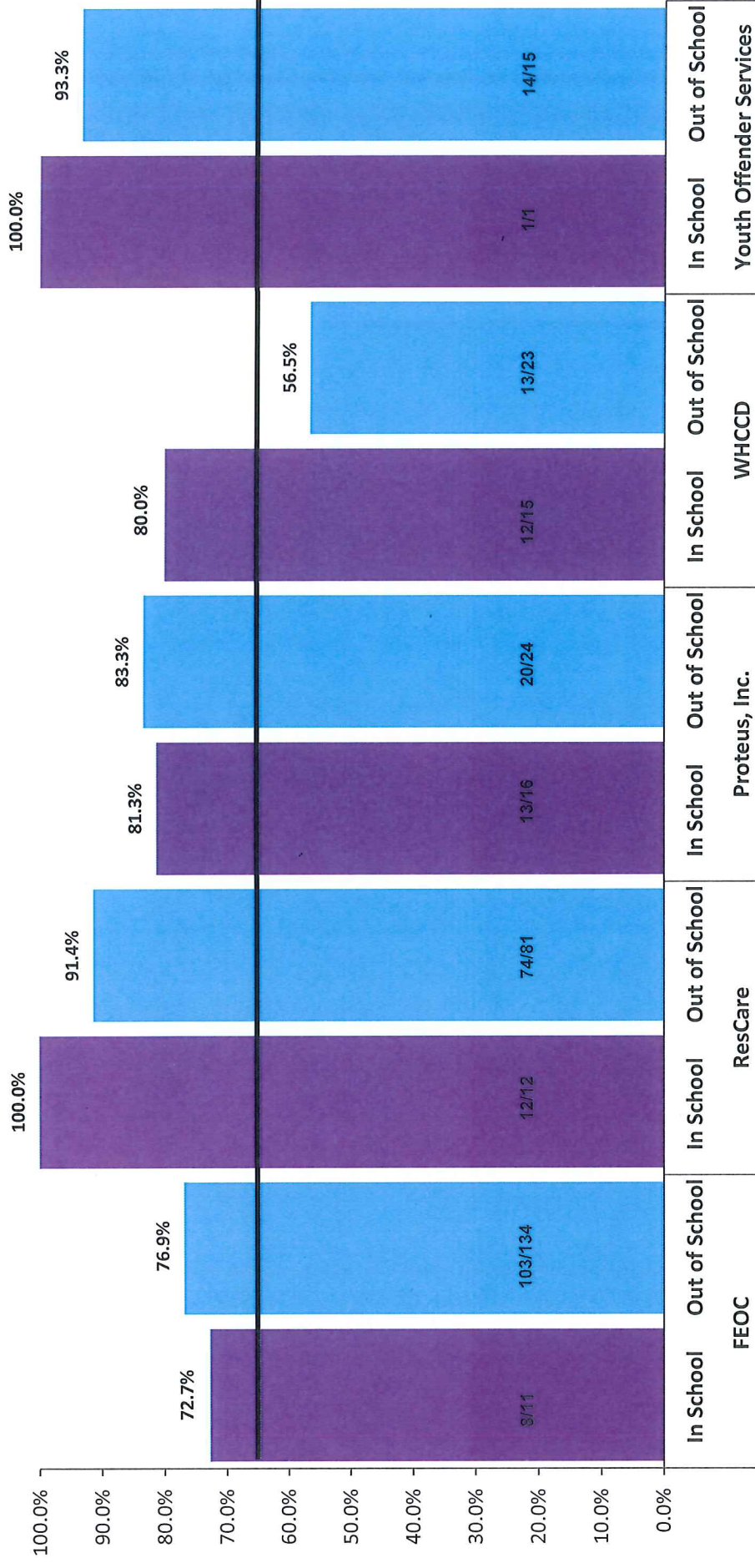

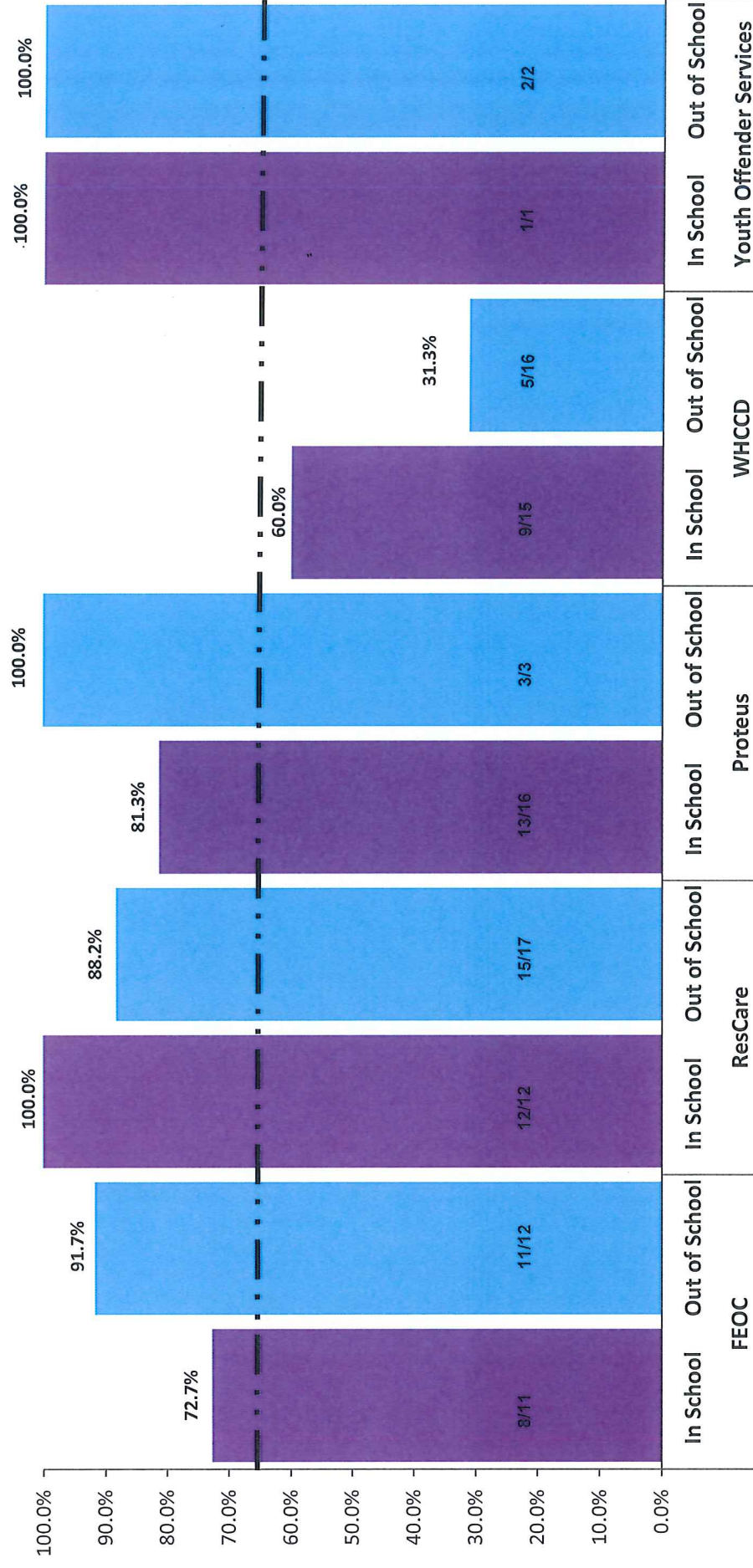

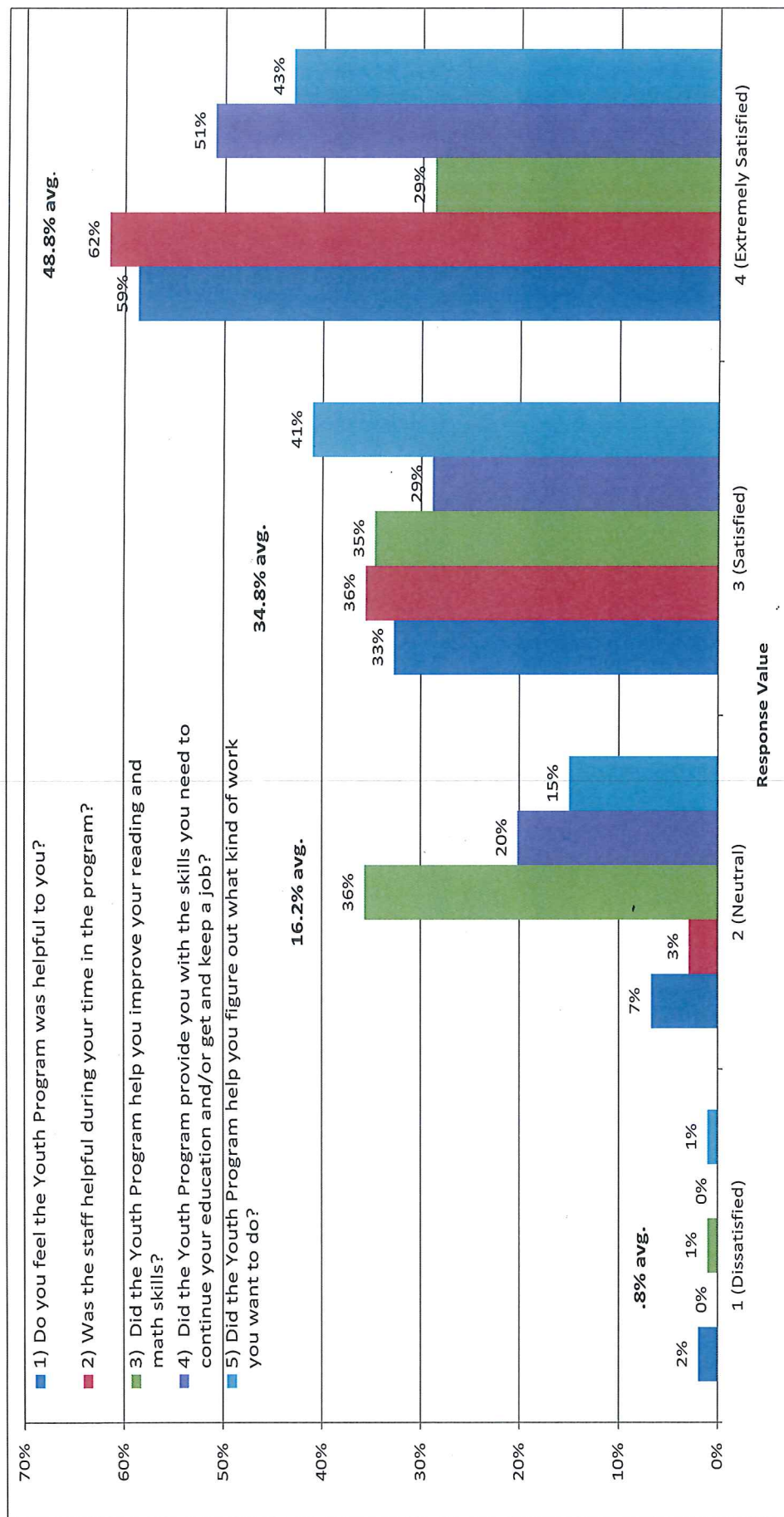
As part of this responsibility, FRWDB staff has implemented the Young Adult Program Satisfaction process and data collection system. The FRWDB's sub-contracted providers of services submit their data to staff on a monthly basis. The data is aggregated, analyzed and reviewed on a quarterly basis and reported to this Council.

FRWDB staff work with service providers to improve the processes used to increase the satisfaction level with our youth and young adult participants. These improvements are based on data collected through these satisfaction surveys, monitoring reviews, complaints and monthly operations meetings between providers and FRWDB staff.

The Workforce Innovation and Opportunity Act (WIOA) has six (6) primary indicators of performance: Employment Rate Second Quarter after Exit, Employment Rate Fourth Quarter after Exit, Median Earnings, Credential Attainment, Measurable Skill Gains, and Effectiveness in Serving Employers. Currently, the State of California has released negotiated goals for local areas for the first four (4) indicators. The last two (2) measures are new and as such are being phased in.

The State of California released WSIN19-24, Final Program Year 2018 WIOA Annual Performance Report on December 30, 2019. This Information Notice informs local areas of the availability of the Final PY 2018 WIOA Annual Performance Report as made available by the California Workforce Development Board. The report, for the first time, included local performance results.

This period of reporting is the first full year for which performance outcomes could be obtained for all WIOA measures. "Baseline" indicates no goals have been developed yet due to the measure being new. The cohort periods for the various indicators are as follows:

 Employment/Education Rate Fourth Quarter (Q4): 01/01/2017 – 12/31/2017
 Median Earnings: 07/01/2017 – 06/30/2018

 Measurable Skill Gains (MSG): 07/01/2018 – 06/30/2019 (real-time)

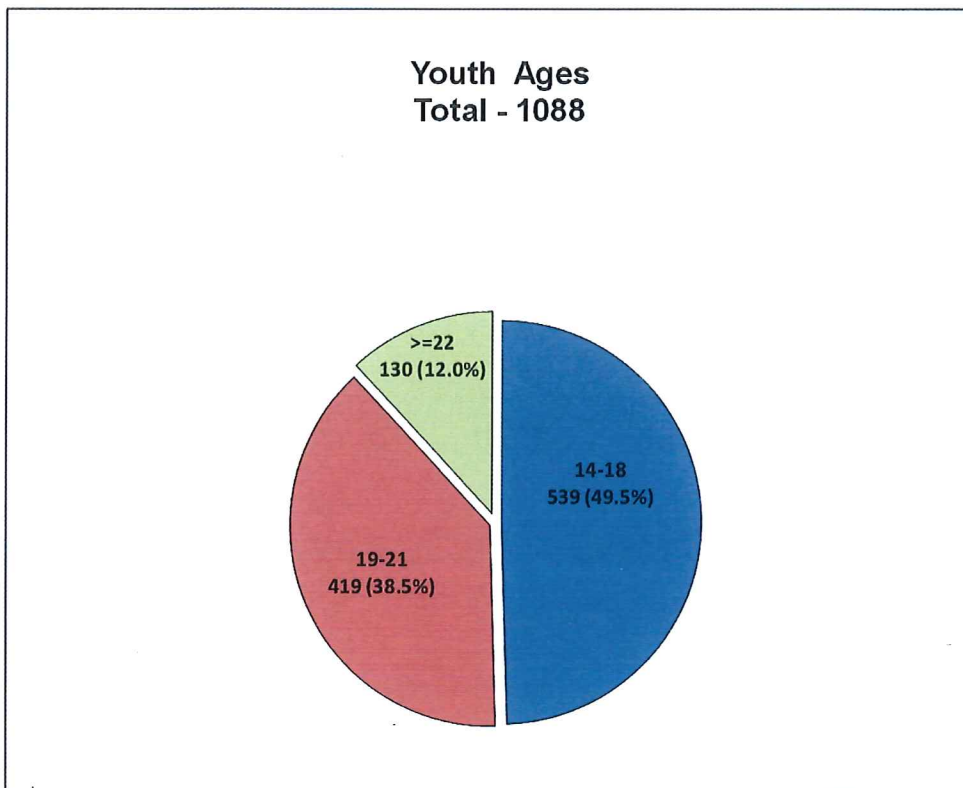

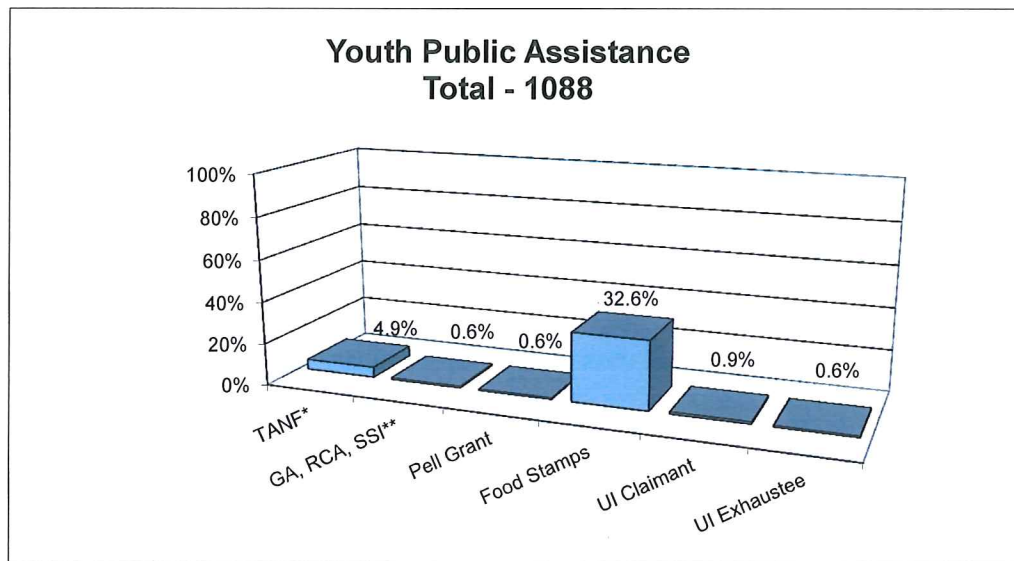
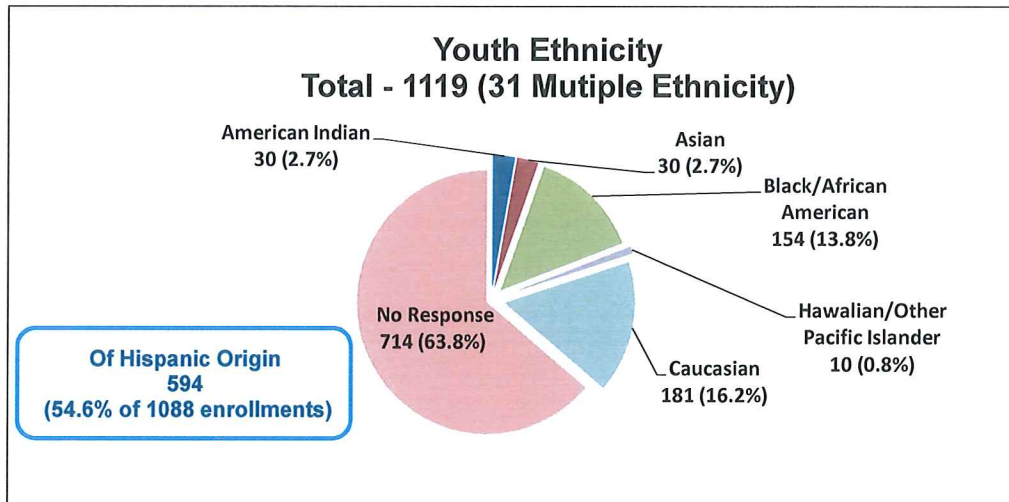
Youth Demographics Second Quarter, Program Year 2019-2020



Youth Demographics Second Quarter, Program Year 2019-2020



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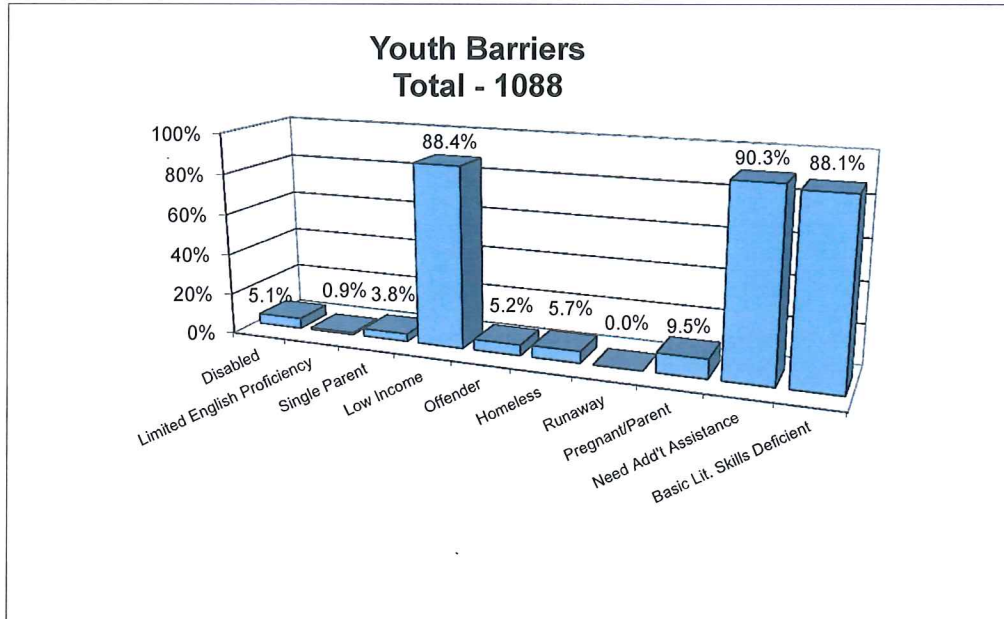
