# Item Description/Action Taken

# 1. May 21, 2019, Special Adult Council Meeting Minutes

Blake Konczal, Executive Director, Fresno Regional Workforce Development Board (FRWDB), presented the May 21, 2019, meeting minutes for correction and/or approval.

# MERCER/WATKINS – APPROVED THE MAY 21, 2019, SPECIAL ADULT COUNCIL MEETING MINUTES.

# 2. Update on High Speed Rail/Construction Pre-Apprenticeship Training

Mr. Konczal explained that a request was made at the May 21, 2019, Special Adult Council (Council) meeting by Director Hensley to provide the Council with an update on the High Speed Rail and Construction Pre-Apprenticeship Training. Mr. Konczal gave a brief report and added that in 2010, Applied Development Economics did a classic study on Agriculture, Manufacturing, Health Care and Infrastructure Construction for a sector analysis. The plan going forward is to redo the study in 2020 to collect current data and focus on public infrastructure and construction.

#### 3. Fresno Regional Workforce Development Board Outstanding Achievement Award

Nuvia Varela, Adult/Youth Program Manager, FRWDB, presented a short video that revealed the FRWDB Outstanding Achievement Award for the Second Quarter of Program Year (PY) 2019-2020 had been awarded to Adriana Munoz. Ms. Munoz was nominated for the award because of her positive attitude, perseverance, and commitment while going through the Licensed Vocational Nurse and Certified Nursing Assistant programs. Ms. Munoz is currently working at PACE and plans to get her Registered Nurse certification.

This was an information item.

# 4. Ratification of New Adult Council Member

Mr. Konczal stated that Elizabeth Rivinius with United Food and Commercial Workers Local 8 had expressed interest in becoming a member of the Council. Chair Hensley requested that the Council vote to recommend that the FRWDB ratify the appointment.

# MERCER/OLIVARES – RECOMMENDED THAT THE FRWDB RATIFY ELIZABETH RIVINIUS AS A NEW ADULT COUNCIL MEMBER (UNANIMOUS).

# 5. Updated Procurement Policy

Stephen DeWitt, Quality Systems Manager, FRWDB, stated that the California Employment Development Department (EDD) released an update to the Procurement of Equipment and Related Services, on July 23, 2019. FRWDB staff drafted an update to the local policy to reflect these changes. The main focus was to make the process easier for the procurements that fall under \$250,000. Mr. DeWitt added that Legal Counsel made last minute changes and a revised copy was given to the Council at the start of the meeting. Mr. DeWitt stated that changes were redlined and highlighted in yellow for convenience.

# OLIVARES/WATKINS – RECOMMENDED THAT THE FRWDB ACCEPT THE UPDATED PROCUREMENT POLICY. (UNANIMOUS)

# 6. <u>Photocopy Machines Request for Proposals Award</u>

Mr. DeWitt presented for the Council's recommendation to the FRWDB, the approval of a contract for photocopy machines and associated Maintenance/Service Agreement for the America's Job Centers of California (AJCC) and the FRWDB Administrative Offices.

FRWDB staff released a Request for Proposals on August 30, 2019, and held a mandatory Bidders' Conference on September 10, 2019. Four (4) proposals were received by the deadline with three (3) qualified to move forward to the Evaluation Phase. Based on the final scores of the rating team, the recommended contract should go to the Ray Morgan Company.

# MERCER/WATKINS – RECOMMENDED THAT THE FRWDB AWARD THE PHOTOCOPY MACHINES LEASE AND MAINTENANCE CONTRACT TO THE RAY MORGAN COMPANY. (UNANIMOUS)

# 7. <u>Workforce Innovation and Opportunity Act Adult and Dislocated Worker Carryover</u> <u>Funding Recommendations for Program Year 2019-2020</u>

Phyllis Stogbauer, Deputy Director of Program Services, FRWDB, stated that when the California EDD released the Workforce Innovation and Opportunity Act (WIOA) formula allocations for PY 2019-2020, the allocation was only an estimate. The Fiscal closeout for PY 2018-2019 had now been finalized and the WIOA Adult and Dislocated Worker (DW) programs have a total of \$4,904,098 of carryover funds, a difference of \$1,074,526 from the initial estimated amount.

The proposed unobligated carryover funds would increase PY 2020-2021 carryover from three percent (3%), to 11.65%. It would also increase Adult and DW sub-contractors by five percent (5%).

# OLIVARES/WATKINS – RECOMMENDED THAT THE FRWDB APPROVE THE WORKFORCE INNOVATION AND OPPORTUNITY ACT ADULT AND DISLOCATED WORKER CARRYOVER FUNDING RECOMMENDATIONS FOR PROGRAM YEAR 2019-2020. (UNANIMOUS)

# 8. <u>Transfer of Dislocated Worker Program Funds to the Adult Program</u>

Ms. Stogbauer requested that the Council recommend that the FRWDB approve the transfer of \$1,887,000 of DW program funds to the Adult program. Ms. Stogbauer explained that the WIOA allows up to 100% of the funds to be transferred between the two (2) funding streams.

WATKINS/MERCER – RECOMMENDED THAT THE FRWDB APPROVE THE TRANSFER OF DISLOCATED WORKER PROGRAM FUNDS TO THE ADULT PROGRAM. (UNANIMOUS)

# 9. First Quarter Workforce Innovation and Opportunity Act Adult Participant Training Report for Program Year 2019-2020

Ms. Stogbauer presented the First Quarter WIOA Adult Participant Training Report for PY 2019-2020. Ms. Stogbauer stated that a request was made at the May 21, 2019, Special Council meeting to revise the On-the-Job Training reports. The reason for this was to include information on Vocational Training and Transitional Jobs. The report also included a table that provided year to date enrollment data for each of the workforce training services by provider.

The Council agreed the revised report was helpful and would like to see it on the agenda for future meetings. Mr. Konczal added that FRWDB staff will add a column that shows percentages for expenditures.

Keith Bergthold, Partner, Central Labor Council Partnership (CLC-P), Forrest Jeffreys, North Area Manager, Proteus, Inc., and April Betterson, Program Manager, West Hills Community College District (WHCCD), took turns reporting on their sections of the graphs. Mr. Jeffreys introduced Maria Gonzalez as the new Area Manager for Proteus, Inc.

Ms. Betterson responded that instead of adding an Employment Readiness Specialist to their team, staff is now employed fulltime at the WHCCD location. Ms. Gonzalez stated that for Proteus, Inc. the expenditures were low due to a large underspent amount in the fringe benefits.

For Proteus, Inc. there were two (2) findings closed and two (2) findings conditionally closed pending the next review. Mr. DeWitt added that for the fiscal monitoring there were no findings.

# **RECOMMENDATION**:

Recommend that the Fresno Regional Workforce Development Board (FRWDB) approve Workforce Innovation and Opportunity Act (WIOA) Adult and Dislocated Worker funding allocations for Program Year (PY) 2020-2021 as outlined in the attached budget allocation worksheet (Attachment I).

# **REASON FOR RECOMMENDATION:**

The Employment Development Department (EDD), Workforce Services Division, released WIOA formula allocations for PY 2020-2021 on May 14, 2020 (Attachment II). These allocations are based on the allotment levels issued by the U.S. Department of Labor, Employment and Training Administration to the states on April 23, 2020.

The FRWDB received \$11,110,660 of Adult and Dislocated Worker funds, an overall increase of eight percent (8%) compared to last year's allocation of \$10,249,265. The projected carryover for the WIOA Adult program is \$5,637,583, which is a 15% increase compared to \$4,904,937 for PY 2019-2020. This brings the total available funding to \$16,748,243 which results in an overall net increase of 11%.

FRWDB staff recommends that the Adult Council approve the proposed budget allocations as outlined in Attachment I. Approval of the recommended funding allocations will result in the following:

- Maintain 11.65% carryover to PY 2021-2022;
- Allocate 30% of total award for training as mandated by the State of California in SB734. All training funds are allocated to the current plan year Training and Incumbent Worker Training pools;
- Allocate an increase of \$515,113 of anticipated unexpended training funds from PY 2019–2020 to ensure full expenditure of mandated training funds by June 30, 2021;
- Increase Adult and Dislocated Worker sub-contractors by five percent (5%);
- Maintain Supportive Service pools;
- Maintain Participant Workshop pool;
- Decrease \$70,000 (70%) funding for the Fresno County Public Defender's office for the Clean Slate program. This program assists job seekers in filing legal documents to assist them in

addressing legal barriers to employment, i.e., criminal record expungements and back child support payments;

- Maintain \$50,000 for community outreach;
- Maintain \$90,000 to VR Technical Services for Information Technology programming and maintenance;
- Maintain facility site budgets for Provider staff training such as Active Shooter, Customer Center Design, and for marketing and outreach.

# FISCAL IMPACT:

Approval of this item will allocate \$16,748,243 of WIOA Adult and Dislocated Worker funds, which will be allocated to FRWDB operational, sub-contracts and participant pools and allocates \$1,294,392 to carryover for PY 2021-2022.

# WIOA FORMULA ALLOCATIONS – PY 20-21

The Workforce Innovation and Opportunity Act (WIOA) Title I formula fund allocations for each Local Workforce Development Area (Local Area), for Program Year (PY) 2020-21, have been released. These allocations (Adult, Youth, and Dislocated Worker (DW)) are based on the allotments issued by the U.S. Department of Labor (DOL), to the states per <u>Training and</u> <u>Employment Guidance Letter 16-19</u>, dated April 23, 2020.

The WIOA prescribes a specific method to calculate sub-state hold harmless levels for DW Program funds. As a result, there is an alignment in the WIOA hold harmless provisions across the Youth, Adult, and DW programs. These hold harmless provisions were established to help mitigate year-to-year volatility in funding levels. Under the WIOA, hold harmless provisions ensure that each area receives no less than 90 percent of their average percentage share from the two prior years. The local areas that receive more than 100 percent of their average percentage share from the previous two years will be proportionately reduced by the amount of total funding necessary to ensure that all local areas receive at least 90 percent of their average percentage share from the two prior years.

Please be aware that this notice is being issued for planning and budgeting purposes only because the state has not yet received the federal Notice of Award (NOA) for any of the funding streams. Once the NOA has been received, Youth allocations will be released to Local Areas immediately. Youth allotments to the states will be issued in one sum with an effective date of April 1, 2020, under the grant code 301. The Adult and DW allocations will be released as soon as we receive federal and state spending authority for these funds.

The allotment to California and the amounts available for the formula allocation to the local areas are listed below. Attachment 1 reflects the total amount local areas will receive for each of the funding streams during the PY 20-21. Additionally, Attachment 2 provides a breakdown of how each of the three funding streams are allocated.

The project continues the training program funded under the Workforce Accelerator Fund 7.0 project, providing Forestry Tech training to an additional 75 youth in the Central Valley. The Central Valley Forestry Corps will foster the health of our forest and address unprecedented tree mortality by engaging in fuel reduction and pest management.

# **RECOMMENDATION:**

# **REASON FOR RECOMMENDATION:**

In 2012, the State of California passed Senate Bill (SB) 734, which mandated local workforce boards to a training expenditure requirement of their WIOA Adult and Dislocated Worker formula fund allocations for workforce training services. These workforce training services include: Vocational Skills Training, Transitional Jobs (paid work experience) and On-the-Job Training activities. This initially required local boards to expend a minimum of 25% of funding beginning in PY 2012-2013 and increase the mandated expenditure requirement to 30% in PY 2016-2017.

The WIOA formula funding has a two (2) year life cycle, and local areas are mandated to fully expend the required training funding by June 30<sup>th</sup> of the last program year, e.g., training funds allocated in PY 2017-2018 were required to be fully expended by June 30, 2019. The total training allocation for PY 2017-2018 was \$2,742,578. Final total expenditures as of June 30, 2019, were \$2,656,153, 29.05% of the total allocation, which is 0.95% below the mandated 30% expenditure requirement.

The total training allocation for PY 2018-2019 was \$2,934,887, and PY 2019-2020 was \$3,074,780. The following table provides training allocations and year to date expenditures by provider through March 31, 2020.





Year-to-Date Local Performance Results





Recommend that the Fresno Regional Workforce Development Board (FRWDB) accept the Second and Third Quarter Job Seeker Customer Satisfaction Reports for Program Year (PY) 2019-2020.

# **REASON FOR RECOMMENDATION:**

The FRWDB Joint Powers Agreement states, in part, that FRWDB staff shall fulfill administrative responsibilities as set forth in the Workforce Innovation and Opportunity Act (WIOA), including the administering of programs as described in the WIOA, as well as developing budgets plans. Additional administrative responsibilities and authorities shall include assessing the performance and evaluating the benefit, productivity, and impact of all programs funded under the WIOA, as amended or superseded, and submitting progress reports.

As part of this responsibility, FRWDB staff has implemented the Job Seeker Customer Satisfaction process and data collection system. The FRWDB's sub-contracted providers of services submit their data to staff on a monthly basis. The data is accumulated, analyzed and reviewed on a quarterly basis and reported to this Council.

FRWDB staff work with service providers to improve the processes used to increase the satisfaction level with our job seekers. These improvements are based on data collected through these satisfaction surveys, monitoring reviews, complaints and monthly operations meetings between provider and FRWDB staff.



# **REASON FOR RECOMMENDATION:**

The WIOA has six (6) primary indicators of performance: Employment Rate 2nd Quarter (Q2) after Exit, Employment Rate 4th Quarter (Q4) after Exit, Median Earnings, Credential Attainment, Measurable Skill Gains, and Effectiveness in Serving Employers. Currently, the State of California has released negotiated goals for local areas for the first four indicators. The last two measures are new and as such are being phased in.

The State of California released WSIN19-24, Final Program Year 2018 WIOA Annual Performance Report on December 30, 2019. This Information Notice informs local areas of the availability of the Final Program Year 2018 WIOA Annual Performance Report as made available by the California Workforce Development Board. The report, for the first time, included local performance results.

This period of reporting is the first full year for which performance outcomes could be obtained for all WIOA measures. "Baseline" indicates no goals have been developed yet due to the measure being new. The cohort periods for the various indicators are as follows:

Employment Rate Q2: 07/01/2017 - 06/30/2018 Employment Rate Q4: 01/01/2017 - 12/31/2017 Median Earnings: 07/01/2017 - 06/30/2018 Credential Rate: 01/01/2017 - 12/31/2017 Measurable Skill Gains (MSG): 07/01/2018 - 06/30/2019 (real-time)

Dislocated Worker Demographics Third Quarter, Program Year 2019-2020







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
# Dislocated Worker Demographics Third Quarter, Program Year 2019-2020








