The meeting was called to order at 4:00 p.m.

Blake Konczal, Executive Director, Fresno Regional Workforce Development Board (FRWDB), distributed to the Directors a list of acronyms used by FRWDB staff and service providers.

#### Item Description/Action Taken

#### 6. Committee Reports

<u>Adult Council</u>: Director Riojas shared that the Adult Council (Council) met on January 25<sup>th</sup>. There was a presentation by Annette Watkins, Central Labor Council, Partnership (CLC), providing an overview of CLC's Dislocated Worker program throughout Fresno County. The Council saw videos highlighting the First Quarter Outstanding Achievement Award winners for Adult Participant and Adult Business. They reviewed and recommended for approval the standing quarterly reports, and recommended the ratification of Director Rodney Branch to the Council.

Executive Committee: Director Avila reported that the Executive Committee (Committee) met on January 17<sup>th</sup>, when they reviewed and accepted the November 2023 Financial Report and Agency Budget and Expenditures Reports. The Committee approved two (2) contract awards: the Microsoft Office 365 Services and the Student Training and Employment Program. Mr. Konczal provided the Committee with the Director's Quarterly Update, highlighting the areas Mr. Konczal focused on during the previous quarter.

Director Vicente arrived (4:11 p.m.)

Skills Development Council: Director Zabrycki shared that the Skills Development Council (SDC) held their meeting on February 7<sup>th</sup>. At that time, they were presented with several in depth reports: Participant Training and Expenditure Report, Special Grants Report, Discretionary Grants Report, and an overview of trainings available for partner and FRWDB staff. The SDC was also presented with the FRWDB marketing update, specifically regarding the newly placed billboards in Modesto, Bakersfield, Parlier, Sanger, Kerman and Firebaugh.

This was an information item.

#### 7. Board Member Spotlight

Director Carole Goldsmith, Chancellor of the State Center Community College District (SCCCD), shared a PowerPoint presentation about the District's vision and an overview of new facilities throughout the four (4) campuses: Fresno City College, Reedley College, Clovis Community College and Madera Community College. She indicated that Fresno City College was the oldest community college in the state of California, and Madera Community College was the newest in the state. Currently, the District served more than 60,000 students, in an area that covers over 5,700 square miles.

Director Goldsmith highlighted some of the Districts new facilities. Reedley College has a new Math, Science, and Engineering building, and approximately 40% of the Engineering students at Fresno State come from SCCCD. Director Goldsmith invited the FRWDB to visit the facility in the future. Also in Reedley is the new Center for Fine and Performing Arts, as well as the Child Development Center.

Director Bonner arrived (4:16 p.m.)

The First Responder's campus is located in southeast Fresno, where the valley's paramedics, firefighters, and police are trained. The West Fresno Campus, which now has 1,000 students, was an \$87 million project with a mix of local and state funds, and funds from the Transformational Climate Change grant. Director Goldsmith noted that the SCCCD had one of the largest nursing programs in the state.

Located at the Madera Community College campus, is the brand-new Madera Academic Village 2, which houses the library and academic areas. Also at the Madera campus is The Center for Agriculture and Technology, which came out of Measure C funding. Plans are underway for the groundbreaking for a new Madera Community College campus in Oakhurst.

She reported that Fresno City College now had a new 900 stall parking structure off Blackstone Avenue, and in progress was the new Science and Engineering building at the Fresno City College campus that was designed to pay homage to the campus' old Administration brick building.

SCCCD is working to advance equitable student access and achievement. Director Goldsmith stated that Community Colleges are the gateway to universities and also prepares students by providing training and support to enter the workforce. They conducted a survey about six (6) months ago and learned that the community's top priorities were: #1 Expanding healthcare programs, especially nursing; #2 Caring for returning veterans; and #3 Expanding vocational programs.

This was an information item.

#### 8. In the Community – Marketing Update

Martha Espinosa, Marketing and Grants Manager, FRWDB, provided highlights of recent marketing activities and events, focusing on the Second Quarter (Q2) of Program Year 2023-2024.

Ms. Espinosa shared that the FRWDB continued its marketing efforts with paid radio spots, advertising on television, and the use of social media. In addition, FRWDB started a short campaign of YouTube ads to make certain that people were aware of the new job center locations throughout Fresno County. Also new was the use of billboards to promote the FRWDB's training programs. Billboards were being used to outreach to the rural and west areas. Billboards have been placed in Parlier, Sanger, Kerman, and Firebaugh, in both English and Spanish.

She introduced new FRWDB staff, Ailing Cheng, who is the new Marketing Content Creator, who was making certain that the marketing campaigns were consistently running and posting on social media was consistent. Ms. Cheng also attended all Scholarship Panels to take a photo of Scholarship recipients for posting on social media.

Ms. Espinosa showed the television commercial that ran on KMPH to promote the ValleyBuild program. She noted that it was very intentional that a female was used in the commercial to encourage females in construction.

Some of the outreach events held in Q2 included: Fresno Adult School Resource Fair, the Central Unified College and Career Night, handing out flyers at food distribution and trunk-or-treat events, Sanger Job and Resource Fair, and the Reedley High School College and Career Expo.

In February, FRWDB held a job fair at the Ramada Inn that had over 500 registrants and 20 employers and seven (7) training providers. The theme was Leap into a New Career, as it was a leap year.

Ms. Espinosa shared about upcoming events: ValleyBuild Graduation Ceremony on Friday, March 29<sup>th</sup>; the FRWDB Annual Achievement Awards breakfast on April 17<sup>th</sup> at Fresno Fields by Wedgewood; and Govaganza Job Fair at Chukchansi Park on April 30<sup>th</sup>.

In response to Chair Montalbano's request at a previous meeting to have FRWDB staff to bring back former participants to hear about what they are currently doing in their career, Ms. Espinosa introduced Lenny Edelbacher. Mr. Edelbacher enrolled at Workforce Connection in 2019, and was awarded a scholarship to the HVAC program at institute of technology. Mr. Edelbacher shared his journey from enrollment and training to obtaining a job and then going on to start his own business.

Director Goldsmith asked Ms. Espinosa which of the FRWDB's marketing efforts yielded the best return on investment. Ms. Espinosa stated that word of mouth and reputation was the best way to get the word out about the FRWDB's many program offerings. Director Olivares stated that while serving on Scholarship Panels, he consistently hears that participants learned about Workforce Connection from another person.

Director Metters asked what Directors could do to help support the FRWDB's marketing and communication efforts and Ms. Espinosa indicated that attending events and sharing about the FRWDB's events and programs within their own organizations would be a great way to support FRWDB's marketing efforts.

This was an information item.

#### 9. Approval of the December 6, 2023, Meeting Minutes

RIOJAS/BONNER - APPROVED THE DECEMBER 6, 2023, MEETING MINUTES. (UNANIMOUS)

#### 10. January 2024 Financial Report

Mr. Konczal presented the January 2024 Financial Report for the FRWDB's acceptance. He reviewed the grants that were highlighted in the agenda item and stated that FRWDB staff had no concerns with grant expenditures.

Director Sotiropulos asked about the Bitwise Grant and would the program end once the funds were expended. Mr. Konczal explained that the contract for the Bitwise funding was two (2) years, but that because it was an Additional Assistance grant, he believed the state would be amendable to extending it, if needed. Mr. Konczal shared that FRWDB staff supporting the former Bitwise employees received a large number of questions about taxes. To respond to these questions, FRWDB staff received authorization from the state to use an accounting firm to give presentations and answer questions about filing taxes and how to get a W-2 from a company that had closed. Those tax seminars were scheduled for March 8<sup>th</sup>, 9<sup>th</sup>, and 21<sup>st</sup>.

#### KARBASSI/ZABRYCKI – ACCEPTED THE JANUARY 2024 FINANCIAL REPORT. (UNANIMOUS)

#### 11. Government Update

Diane Jensen, Government Relations Coordinator, FRWDB, provided an update on the March 5 election results, and congratulated Director Karbassi on his re-election to the Fresno City Council. She also provided updates on some the of the legislation she had been tracking.

Workforce Innovation and Opportunity Act (WIOA) Re-Authorization: HR 6655, A Stronger Workforce for America Act is the proposed reauthorization and enhancement of WIOA. Key components of this bill include modernizing workforce development, updating programs and services to align with current workforce demands, introducing technology-driven approaches for training, expanding access to education and training, and supporting disadvantaged communities and promoting economic resilience. Ms. Jensen explained that the primary area of concern was that it would mandate a new 50% training requirement for Workforce Development Boards (WDBs). Mr. Konczal added that California already had a 30% training set aside and that it took years to get up to that level. He explained that the state's idea behind the training set aside was that more people would receive training, but that in reality, many local areas purchased more expensive training in order to meet the 30%, rather than training more individuals. This, along with the Governor's reserves of 15% of WIOA money going up to 25% would really impact WDBs' budgets. He noted that this is just the House version of this bill, so it is not necessarily the final version.

AB 1228 Fast Food Minimum Wage: Effective April 1, 2024, the fast food minimum wage was approved to increase to \$20.00 an hour. Ms. Jensen explained that this would only impact fast food restaurants that have 60 or more establishments nationally. She indicated that Garrett LeCat, CLC Partnership and John Lorance, City of Fresno Economic Development, have been preparing to assist businesses with strategies for managing increased labor costs and maintaining profitability, as well as providing assistance to workers, to help them understand their rights and entitlements under AB 1228.

She concluded her report by sharing that Director Edgar Blunt and FRWDB Marketing/Grants Manager Martha Espinosa, would be attending the One Voice trip in Washington, DC, where they will be requesting administrative relief from the Department of Labor in three (3) areas: 1) Incumbent Worker Training: Selective Services Registration Certification; 2) WIOA Supportive Service payments; and 3) Tracking of training-related placements at Community Colleges.

This was an information item.

#### 12. Fresno Regional Workforce Development Board Council Appointments Policy

Mr. Konczal presented for the FRWDB's approval, the FRWDB Council Appointments Policy. He explained that in addition to the Executive Committee, the FRWDB had three (3) Councils: Adult Council, Skills Development Council, and Youth Council. Unlike the FRWDB Directors, Council members (non-board members) had no policy to govern the length of their appointment, attendance, or the number of non-board members there could be on a Council. The Executive Committee directed FRWDB staff to draft a policy to address these items.

Some of the new policy recommendations included: 1) The three (3) Councils of the FRWDB would have seven (7) Directors on each Council; 2) A majority of members of any Council must be FRWDB board members (Directors); 3) Board members would be allowed to have formal membership on only one (1) Council at a time; 4) Non-board Council members would have a term of two (2) years, and then they must seek re-appointment to continue serving; 5) Non-board Council members' terms would be staggered initially, so not all re-appointments would occur simultaneously; and 6) A non-board Council member would be considered to have "effectively resigned" after missing two (2) consecutive regular Council meetings over any 12-month period of time.

#### 14. Recognition of Board Anniversaries

Second Vice Chair Avila recognized Directors for their years of service on the FRWDB with a presentation of certificates. He recognized Directors whose anniversaries occurred in the months of January through March: Shayn Anderson – one (1) year; Carole Goldsmith – one (1) year; Chris Zeitz – one (1) year; Terry Metters, Jr. – two (2) years; Wyatt Meadows – two (2) years; Stephen Avila – three (3) years; Alysia Bonner – four (4) years; Mike Karbassi – four (4) years; Sal Quintero – five (5) years; Vasili Sotiropulos – six (6) years; and Chuck Riojas – 17 years.

This was an information item.

#### 15. <u>Information Sharing</u>

Director Riojas shared that he was invited by the High Speed Rail Authority to present on preapprenticeship training programs in Washington, DC. He stated that representatives from all over the world will be there and that he would be sharing about the good work being done in Fresno in the area of pre-apprenticeship training.

This was a discussion item.

#### 16. Agenda Item's for June 5, 2024, Meeting

Director Hensley indicated that presentations from the FRWDB's different contractors would be helpful.

This was a discussion item.

#### 17. <u>Meeting Feedback</u>

No meeting feedback was provided.

Accept the Fresno Regional Workforce Development Board (FRWDB) April 2024 Financial Report.

#### **REASON FOR RECOMMENDATION:**

The attached summary financial report and charts display year-to-date financial information through April 30, 2024.

- Workforce Innovation and Opportunity Act Rapid Response: On May 20, 2024, this grant received an extension to September 30, 2024. It is 55.77% expended at \$176,463.
- Transformative Climate Communities (TCC): This grant ends May 31, 2024. It is 42.04% expended at \$529,816 with an unspent amount of \$719,616.
- 2020 September Wildfires ended December 31, 2023, and it was 81.18% expended at \$243,546, with an unspent amount of \$56,454.
- CAL FIRE Round 1: This grant received an extension to March 1, 2025, and it is 99.47% expended at \$1,666,246.
- Equity and Special Populations (ESP): This grant ended March 31, 2024. It was 74.61% expended at \$559,571 with an unspent amount of \$190,429.
- City of Fresno One Youth Job Corps: FRWDB was awarded an additional \$100,000 for client support services in January 2024. This grant received an extension to June 30, 2024, from May 1, 2024. It is 83.26% expended at \$623,376 with an unspent amount of \$125,304.
- Staff has no concerns with other grant expenditures at this time.

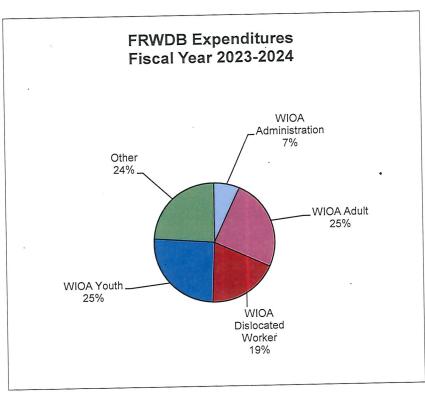

Specifically, this funding would support the expansion of the ValleyBuild model to serve women, English language learners, justice-involved individuals, youth, and other under-resourced individuals through specialized pre-apprenticeship training to prepare them for careers in the building and construction trades.

Since the implementation of the project, FRWDB staff and project partners have identified the need for additional subrecipients to provide services under the grant and to provide additional funding for current subrecipients to ensure services are provided as outlined in the grant award.

Approve contract modifications for contracts awarded by the FRWDB through the High Road Training Partnerships Resilient Workforce Fund (HRTP RWF) grant funding.

The Adult Council approved this recommendation on May 23, 2024.

#### **REASON FOR RECOMMENDATION:**

In June 2023, the Fresno Regional Workforce Development Board (FRWDB) was awarded \$2,500,000 of HRTP funding, which supports the development of skilled workforce necessary to mitigate or adapt to climate disruption and environmental threat. Specifically, this funding supports the expansion of the Central Valley Forestry Corps program, a best practice model developed to recruit, train, provide work experience, and link local residents to quality entry-level jobs in the forestry sector.

Under the initial contract awards, the FRWDB awarded funding to various contractors funded under the grant, which included contracts to the Fresno Economic Opportunities Commission's Local Conservation Corps (Fresno EOC-LCC) in the amount of \$45,000, and Kern Community College District (KCCD) in the amount of \$30,000. Since the implementation of the project, FRWDB staff and project partners have identified additional funding needs for the EOC-LCC and KCCD to ensure services are provided as outlined in the grant award.

Contingent upon approval of a proposed budget modification from the CWDB, the Adult Council is recommending the FRWDB approve the following budget modifications.

#### **RECOMMENDATION:**

Approve Workforce Innovation and Opportunity Act (WIOA) Adult and Dislocated Worker estimated funding allocations for Program Year (PY) 2024-2025 as outlined in the attached budget allocation worksheet (Attachment I).

The Adult Council approved this recommendation on May 23, 2024.

#### **REASON FOR RECOMMENDATION:**

The Employment Development Department (EDD), Workforce Services Division, released WIOA Formula Planning Estimate Allocations on May 15, 2024 (Attachment II). These allocations are based on the estimated allotment levels issued by the U.S. Department of Labor, Employment and Training Administration to the states on February 12, 2024.

Once the actual PY 2024-2025 WIOA Adult and Dislocated Worker funding allocations from EDD have been received and Fresno Regional Workforce Development Board (FRWDB) staff has completed the reconciliation of the PY 2023-2024 carryover, FRWDB staff will bring the revised funding recommendations to the October 2024, Adult Council meeting.

The FRWDB received an estimated award of \$10,442,615 for Adult and Dislocated Worker funds, an overall increase of 8.43% compared to last year's allocation of \$9,631,108. The projected carryover for the WIOA Adult and Dislocated Worker program is estimated at \$4,730,421, which is a 25.71% decrease compared to \$6,367,555 for PY 2023-2024. This brings the total available estimated funding to \$15,173,036, which results in an overall estimated net decrease of 5.16%, or \$825,627, for PY 2024–2025.

The Adult Council recommends that the FRWDB approve the proposed estimated budget allocations as outlined in Column D of Attachment I. Approval of the recommended estimated funding allocations will result in the following:

- Maintain a 3% carryover to PY 2025-2026;
- \$336,233 increase in AJCC Facility/Site Budgets;
- \$28,403 increase in Commmunity Outreach/Marketing Budget;
- \$444,150 decrease in One Time Costs (prior PY moving and furniture costs);
- 15.40% decrease to both the FRWDB Admin and Program Support in the amount of \$470,931;

- Maintain the 30% training requirement of the total estimated award for training, as mandated by the State of California in SB734, for PY 2024-2025. All training funds are allocated to the current PY Training and Incument Worker Training pools;
- \$289,505 decrease in Prior Plan Year Training Reserve.

#### **FISCAL IMPACT**:

Approval of this item will allocate \$15,173,036 of WIOA Adult and Dislocated Worker funds, which will be allocated to FRWDB operational, sub-contracts and participant pools.

The Employment Development Department has released the Workforce Innovation and Opportunity Act (WIOA) Title I formula fund allocations for each Local Workforce Development Area (Local Area), for the Adult, Youth, and Dislocated Worker funding streams for Program Year (PY) 2024-25. These allocations are based on the estimated allotment levels issued by the U.S. Department of Labor, Employment and Training Administration to the states in Training and Employment Notice 19-23 (PDF), dated February 12, 2024. These allotment levels are provided as an estimate for planning purposes and will change based on the enacted PY 24 full-year appropriation expected in April 2024. The planning estimates in this notice provide Local Areas with a general idea of how their funding will change in PY 24, assuming there are no major increases or decreases enacted by Congress.

The WIOA prescribes a specific method to calculate sub-state hold harmless levels which ensure that each Local Area receives no less than 90 percent of their average percentage share from the two prior years. These hold harmless provisions were established to help minimize year-to-year volatility in funding levels and limit any Local Area's year-over funding increase to 100 percent of their prior year allocation. The Local Areas that receive more than 100 percent of their average percentage share from the previous two years will be proportionately reduced by the amount of total funding necessary to ensure that all Local Areas receive at least 90 percent of their average percentage share from the two prior years.

The allotment to California and the amounts available for the formula allocation to its Local Areas are listed below. Youth, Adult, and Dislocated Worker Activities Program Estimate Allotments (attachment 1) reflects the total amount Local Areas will receive for each of the funding streams for PY 24-25. WIOA Planning Estimate Funding SFY 24-25 (attachment 2) provides a breakdown of how each of the three funding streams is allocated.

#### **RECOMMENDATION:**

Approve the Workforce Innovation and Opportunity Act (WIOA) Youth estimated funding allocations for Program Year (PY) 2024-2025 as outlined in the attached budget allocation worksheet (Attachment I).

The Youth Council approved this recommendation on May 23, 2024.

#### **REASON FOR RECOMMENDATION:**

The Employment Development Department (EDD), Workforce Services Division, released WIOA Formula Planning Estimate Allocations on May 15, 2024 (Attachment II). These allocations are based on the estimated allotment levels issued by the U.S. Department of Labor, Employment and Training Administration to the states on February 12, 2024.

Once the actual PY 2024-2025 WIOA Youth funding allocations from EDD have been received and Fresno Regional Workforce Development Board (FRWDB) staff has completed the reconciliation of the PY 2023-2024 carryover, FRWDB staff will bring the revised funding recommendations to the November, 2024, Youth Council meeting.

The FRWDB received an estimated award of \$6,680,223 for Youth funds, an overall increase of 12.99% compared to last year's allocation of \$5,912,242. The projected carryover for the WIOA Youth program is estimated at \$1,627,150, which is a 31.07% decrease compared to \$2,360,422 for PY 2023-2024. This brings the total available estimated funding to \$8,307,373, which results in an overall estimated net increase of .42%, or \$34,709, for PY 2024-2025.

The Youth Council recommends the FRWDB approve the proposed estimated budget allocations as outlined in Colummn D of Attachment I. Approval of the recommended estimated funding allocations will result in the following:

- Maintain a 3% carryover to PY 2025-2026;
- Allocate 20% of total estimated award for Work Experience training as mandated by the Department of Labor;
- \$127,537 increase in America's Job Centers of California Facility/Site Budgets;
- \$15,360 increase in Community Outreach/Marketing Budget;
- \$260,850 decrease in One Time Costs (prior PY moving and furniture costs);

- 20.14% decrease to both the FRWDB Admin and Program Support in the amount of \$367,077;
- \$78,119 increase in Current Plan Year Work Experience Pool;
- \$418,581 increase in Prior Plan Year Work Experience Reserve.

#### **FISCAL IMPACT:**

Approval of this item will allocate \$8,307,373 of WIOA Youth funds, which will be allocated to FRWDB operational, sub-contracts and participant pools.

#### WIOA Formula Planning Estimate Allocations – PY 24-25

**Workforce Services Information Notice**

The Employment Development Department has released the Workforce Innovation and Opportunity Act (WIOA) Title I formula fund allocations for each Local Workforce Development Area (Local Area), for the Adult, Youth, and Dislocated Worker funding streams for Program Year (PY) 2024-25. These allocations are based on the estimated allotment levels issued by the U.S. Department of Labor, Employment and Training Administration to the states in Training and Employment Notice 19-23 (PDF), dated February 12, 2024. These allotment levels are provided as an estimate for planning purposes and will change based on the enacted PY 24 full-year appropriation expected in April 2024. The planning estimates in this notice provide Local Areas with a general idea of how their funding will change in PY 24, assuming there are no major increases or decreases enacted by Congress.

The WIOA prescribes a specific method to calculate sub-state hold harmless levels which ensure that each Local Area receives no less than 90 percent of their average percentage share from the two prior years. These hold harmless provisions were established to help minimize year-to-year volatility in funding levels and limit any Local Area's year-over funding increase to 100 percent of their prior year allocation. The Local Areas that receive more than 100 percent of their average percentage share from the previous two years will be proportionately reduced by the amount of total funding necessary to ensure that all Local Areas receive at least 90 percent of their average percentage share from the two prior years.

The allotment to California and the amounts available for the formula allocation to its Local Areas are listed below. Youth, Adult, and Dislocated Worker Activities Program Estimate Allotments (attachment 1) reflects the total amount Local Areas will receive for each of the funding streams for PY 24-25. WIOA Planning Estimate Funding SFY 24-25 (attachment 2) provides a breakdown of how each of the three funding streams is allocated.
