## Item Description/Action Taken

## 1. May 17, 2023, Adult Council Special Meeting Minutes

Mr. Konczal presented the May 17, 2023, Adult Council (Council) special meeting minutes for the Council's approval.

OLIVARES/MEADOWS - APPROVED THE MAY 17, 2023, ADULT COUNCIL SPECIAL MEETING MINUTES. (UNANIMOUS)

## 2. Adult Provider Spotlight

Mr. Konczal introduced Anette Watkins, Workshop Facilitator/Outreach Specialist, Central Labor Council Partnership (CLC), as the Adult Provider Spotlight presenter.

Ms. Watkins reported that CLC started working with FRWDB on the Adult and Dislocated Worker projects in 2003, and was currently providing services for the Dislocated Worker centers out of the Fresno East, Parlier, Mendota, and occasionally, Fresno West locations. She also spoke about CLC's partners and their successes throughout California. Ms. Watkins spoke about the three (3) funding streams for the Fresno area, and went over the data for the four (4) centers in Fresno County for the period of July 1, 2023, to January 18, 2024.

Director Olivares asked what the Quest Grant was. Arthur Moss, Regional Project Manager, CLC, explained that the Quest Grant was a Dislocated Worker Grant for long-term unemployed workers that stemmed from Covid. Ms. Stogbauer added that the grant was a discretionary state grant from the State of California Employment Development Department (EDD).

This was an information item.

## 3. Adult Participant Success Story

Martha Espinosa, Marketing and Grants Manager, FRWDB, announced that the First Quarter Outstanding Achievement Award was awarded to Myesha Moutra, who obtained employment with Hinds Hospice as a Certified Nursing Assistant. Ms. Espinosa showed a video highlighting Ms. Moutra's journey of training to employment through Workforce Connection.

Ms. Espinosa reported that the First Quarter Adult Business of Excellence winner was Calaveras Healthy Impact Product Solutions (CHIPS). Ms. Espinosa shared that CHIPS made a commitment to employ and retain FRWDB'S forestry participants. She showed a video that highlighted CHIPS and indicated that both video presentations were available on YouTube. Ms. Espinosa stated that the links to the videos would be provided to the Council via email.

Ms. Espinosa provided information about some upcoming events: an information session partnered with Futuro Health on February 15, 2024, the Leap into a New Career Job Fair on February 29, 2024, the ValleyBuild Now graduation on March 29, 2024, the Annual Achievement Awards on April 17, 2024, and Govaganza on April 30, 2024.

Ms. Espinosa presented a large, blank, whiteboard check that had become a new part of the scholarship panel picture process. She explained that it helped participants understand the value of their scholarships, and was a good marketing opportunity for FRWDB.

Director Montalbano asked if the participants got a smaller copy of the check. Ms. Espinosa said no, but they got a copy of the picture and a chance to share it on social media.

#### 4. Ratification of New Adult Council Member

Mr. Konczal presented for the Council's recommendation to the FRWDB, the ratification of Director Rodney Branch to the Adult Council.

## 5. Providers of Services' Monitoring Report

Cheryl Beierschmitt, Deputy Director, Fiscal Services, FRWDB, presented the Second Quarter Providers of Services' Monitoring Report for Program Year (PY) 2023-2024 for recommendation to the FRWDB. Ms. Beierschmitt stated that FRWDB staff conducts programmatic and fiscal monitoring of all contracts to ensure compliance with federal, state, and local regulations and/or policies. She then went over the report containing the overview of the contracts that were monitored during the period of October 1, 2023, through December 31, 2023. Ms. Beierschmitt reported that there were no findings.

## 6. Job Seeker Customer Satisfaction Reports

Phyllis Stogbauer, Senior Deputy Director, FRWDB, presented the Job Seeker Customer Satisfaction Reports for the Second Quarter of PY 2023-2024, for the Council's recommendation to the FRWDB.

Ms. Stogbauer reviewed the report, noting that the placement satisfaction rate for training services dropped from 96.9% in the First Quarter, to 90.2% in the Second Quarter. She stated that there were some participant comments that caused concern with the schools, and she and Tim Giles, Deputy Director Information and General Services, FRWDB, would be looking further into the matter.

Director Olivares requested a breakdown of the urban versus rural demographics on the report.

## 7. 2024 Adult Council Fourth Quarter Meeting Schedule Revision

Mr. Konczal presented the 2024 Adult Council Fourth Quarter Meeting Schedule Revision for the Council's approval. Mr. Konczal explained that the budget had not been released from EDD on time in several years, causing the regularly scheduled meeting in April to be rescheduled to May every year. Therefore, he asked the Council members to come up with a date in May that was amenable to everyone for the Fourth Quarter meeting.

The Council decided on and approved May 23, 2024.

Ms. Stogbauer stated that the Adult Council Fourth Quarter meeting would be scheduled to May annually going forward.

## 8. Adult and Dislocated Worker Demographics Reports

Mr. Giles presented the Second Quarter Adult and Dislocated Worker Demographics Reports for the Council's review.

Director Meadows asked what programs were done with 14 to 18 year-olds, as shown on the graph on page 19. Ms. Stogbauer explained the services and programs offered for the in-school youth and the out-of-school youth.

Director Olivares requested to get a breakdown of the urban and rural demographics, to see who was being served and where they were coming from.

## 9. America's Job Centers of California Usage Report

Mr. Giles presented the America's Job Center of California Usage Report, which is a 13-month trend report that shows the client usage at the AJCC broken out by unique clients receiving AJCC services, and then number of client visits to the AJCC by month.

## **RECOMMENDATION:**

Recommend that the Fresno Regional Workforce Development Board (FRWDB) approve contract awards and modifications for the High Road Construction Careers Resilient Workforce Fund (HRCC RWF) funding, awarded by the California Workforce Development Board (CWDB).

### **REASON FOR RECOMMENDATION:**

In June of 2023, the FRWDB was awarded \$8,825,127 of HRCC funding to support the creation of structured pathways to state-approved apprenticeship programs. Specifically, this funding would support the expansion of the ValleyBuild model to serve women, English language learners, justice-involved individuals, youth, and other under-resourced individuals through specialized pre-apprenticeship training to prepare them for careers in the building and construction trades.

Since the implementation of the project, FRWDB staff and project partners have identified the need for additional contractors to provide services under the grant and to provide additional funding for current contractors to ensure services are provided as outlined in the grant award.

Contingent upon approval of a proposed budget modification from the CWDB, FRWDB staff is requesting the Adult Council recommend the FRWDB approve the following contract awards and budget modifications.

High Road Training Partnerships Resilient Workforce Fund Contract Modifications

## **RECOMMENDATION:**

Recommend that the Fresno Regional Workforce Development Board (FRWDB) approve contract modifications for contracts awarded by the FRWDB through the High Road Training Partnerships Resilient Workforce Fund (HRTP RWF) grant funding.

## **REASON FOR RECOMMENDATION:**

In June 2023, the FRWDB was awarded \$2,500,000 of HRTP funding, which supports the development of skilled workforce necessary to mitigate or adapt to climate disruption and environmental threat. Specifically, this funding supports the expansion of the Central Valley Forestry Corps program, a best practice model developed to recruit, train, provide work experience, and link local residents to quality entry-level jobs in the forestry sector.

Under the initial contract awards, the FRWDB awarded funding to various contractors funded under the grant, which included contracts to the Fresno Economic Opportunities Commission's Local Conservation Corps (Fresno EOC-LCC) in the amount of \$45,000, and Kern Community College District (KCCD) in the amount of \$30,000. Since the implementation of the project, FRWDB staff and project partners have identified additional funding needs for the EOC-LCC and KCCD to ensure services are provided as outlined in the grant award.

Contingent upon approval of a proposed budget modification from the CWDB, FRWDB staff is requesting the Adult Council recommend the FRWDB approve the following budget modifications.

Recommendations for Program Year 2024-2025

### **RECOMMENDATION:**

Recommend that the Fresno Regional Workforce Development Board (FRWDB) approve Workforce Innovation and Opportunity Act (WIOA) Adult and Dislocated Worker estimated funding allocations for Program Year (PY) 2024-2025 as outlined in the attached budget allocation worksheet (Attachment I).

### **REASON FOR RECOMMENDATION:**

The Employment Development Department (EDD), Workforce Services Division, released WIOA Formula Planning Estimate Allocations on May 15, 2024 (Attachment II). These allocations are based on the estimated allotment levels issued by the U.S. Department of Labor, Employment and Training Administration to the states on February 12, 2024.

Once the actual PY 2024-2025 WIOA Adult and Dislocated Worker funding allocations from EDD have been received and FRWDB staff has completed the reconciliation of the PY 2023-2024 carryover, FRWDB staff will bring the revised funding recommendations to the October 2024, Adult Council meeting.

The FRWDB received an estimated award of \$10,442,615 for Adult and Dislocated Worker funds, an overall increase of 8.43% compared to last year's allocation of \$9,631,108. The projected carryover for the WIOA Adult and Dislocated Worker program is estimated at \$4,730,421, which is a 25.71% decrease compared to \$6,367,555 for PY 2023-2024. This brings the total available estimated funding to \$15,173,036, which results in an overall estimated net decrease of 5.16%, or \$825,627, for PY 2024–2025.

FRWDB staff recommends that the Adult Council approve the proposed estimated budget allocations as outlined in Column D of Attachment I. Approval of the recommended estimated funding allocations will result in the following:

- Maintain a 3% carryover to PY 2025-2026;
- \$336,233 increase in AJCC Facility/Site Budgets;
- \$28,403 increase in Commmunity Outreach/Marketing Budget;
- \$444,150 decrease in One Time Costs (prior PY moving and furniture costs);
- 15.40% decrease to both the FRWDB Admin and Program Support in the amount of \$470,931;

- Maintain the 30% training requirement of the total estimated award for training, as mandated by the State of California in SB734, for PY 2024-2025. All training funds are allocated to the current PY Training and Incument Worker Training pools;
- \$289,505 decrease in Prior Plan Year Training Reserve.

## **FISCAL IMPACT**:

Approval of this item will allocate \$15,173,036 of WIOA Adult and Dislocated Worker funds, which will be allocated to FRWDB operational, sub-contracts and participant pools.

## WIOA Formula Planning Estimate Allocations – PY 24-25

**Workforce Services Information Notice** 

WSIN23-43

Issued: May 15, 2024

The Employment Development Department has released the Workforce Innovation and Opportunity Act (WIOA) Title I formula fund allocations for each Local Workforce Development Area (Local Area), for the Adult, Youth, and Dislocated Worker funding streams for Program Year (PY) 2024-25. These allocations are based on the estimated allotment levels issued by the U.S. Department of Labor, Employment and Training Administration to the states in Training and Employment Notice 19-23 (PDF), dated February 12, 2024. These allotment levels are provided as an estimate for planning purposes and will change based on the enacted PY 24 full-year appropriation expected in April 2024. The planning estimates in this notice provide Local Areas with a general idea of how their funding will change in PY 24, assuming there are no major increases or decreases enacted by Congress.

The WIOA prescribes a specific method to calculate sub-state hold harmless levels which ensure that each Local Area receives no less than 90 percent of their average percentage share from the two prior years. These hold harmless provisions were established to help minimize year-to-year volatility in funding levels and limit any Local Area's year-over funding increase to 100 percent of their prior year allocation. The Local Areas that receive more than 100 percent of their average percentage share from the previous two years will be proportionately reduced by the amount of total funding necessary to ensure that all Local Areas receive at least 90 percent of their average percentage share from the two prior years.

The allotment to California and the amounts available for the formula allocation to its Local Areas are listed below. Youth, Adult, and Dislocated Worker Activities Program Estimate Allotments (attachment 1) reflects the total amount Local Areas will receive for each of the funding streams for PY 24-25. WIOA Planning Estimate Funding SFY 24-25 (attachment 2) provides a breakdown of how each of the three funding streams is allocated.
