The meeting was called to order at 4:00 p.m.

COMMENTS BY FRWDB CHAIR
AND/OR EXECUTIVE STAFF:

Chair Edgar Blunt welcomed new Fresno Regional Workforce Development Board (FRWDB) Director, Michael Kelley. Director Kelley is the President and Chief Executive Officer of the Central California Almond Growers Association (CCAGA).

Directors Hensley and Zeitz arrived (4:02 p.m.) - QUORUM ESTABLISHED

Mr. Kelley shared about the CCAGA and stated that they are the largest seller of almonds in the world. He indicated that he was looking forward to working with the FRWDB.

Item Description/Action Taken

6. Committee Reports

Adult Council: Director Olivares provided the Adult Council (Council) report in Director Riojas' absence. He shared that the Adult Council was shown two (2) videos highlighting the Program Year (PY) 2025-2026 Third Quarter Achievement Award winners. Brenda Reyes was selected as the Adult Outstanding Achievement Award recipient, and Green Earth Heating and Air was selected as the Adult Business of Excellence Award recipient.

Director Miller arrived (4:07 p.m.)

Director Olivares reported that the Council reviewed and recommended FRWDB acceptance of the quarterly reports, which included the Local Performance Results Report, the Job Seeker Customer Satisfaction Report, and the Providers of Services Monitoring Report. They also reviewed the America's Job Centers of California Usage Report and Demographics Report.

Executive Committee: Chair Blunt reported that the Executive Committee (Committee) met on January 21, 2026, when they reviewed and approved the November 2025 Agency Budget and Expenditures Report and the November 2025 Financial Report. The Committee reviewed and approved an application to the State of California for FRWDB to be designated as a provider of Workforce Innovation and Opportunity Act (WIOA) Adult and Dislocated Worker career services in Fresno County. The Committee also approved the release of Request for Proposals for WIOA Adult and WIOA Dislocated Worker services. They approved a High Road Training Partnerships Resilient Workforce Fund grant modification, which reallocated \$165,000 from staff salaries and benefits to increase funds used for participant training and work experience. The Committee also approved a contract modification for the High Road Construction Careers Resilient Workforce Fund.

Director Bonner arrived (4:13 p.m.)

Chair Blunt shared that the Committee reviewed an information item outlining the draft FRWDB client engagement framework, which included four (4) proposed client status levels: Engaged, At-Risk, Disengaged, and Exit Pending. Mr. Konczal noted that the Executive Committee proposed developing the draft client engagement criteria as a meaningful metric to track how quickly clients accept workforce services or how quickly FRWDB identifies participants not engaging in available services. He added this data could be tracked and aggregated to help identify trends, leading to improved processes.

Skills Development Council: Director Zabrycki shared that the Skills Development Council (SDC) met on February 4, 2026, at which time they recommended the acceptance of the Eligible Training Provider List Monitoring Report. They were presented with the Individual Training Account report, which covered activities and expenditures for the period of July through December 2025, which totaled \$2,126,449.27. The SDC was presented with an overview of the ValleyBuild program, including the list of multiple grants that fund the program and the regional performance progress for the various regions. The newest project under ValleyBuild is the Disaster Recovery Program, which brings some of the certifications from the forestry program and incorporates them into the Multi-Craft Corps curriculum. The SDC received an informational report on the Greater Sierra Forestry Corps program, as well as the FRWDB's Adult and Young Adult Discretionary grants. FRWDB's Training Manager provided an overview of the staff trainings that occurred in the second quarter of the Program Year.

Youth Council: Director Sotiropulos shared that the Youth Council met on February 19, 2026, at which time they were presented with a Youth Success Story video highlight of a young man's journey to employment as an automotive technician. The Council received an in-depth report on the FRWDB's marketing efforts on the rural west side. Director Sotiropulos noted that FRWDB spends slightly more per person for individuals served on the west side due to not reaching performance goals for numbers served. FRWDB continues to look for ways to meet those goals.

Mr. Konczal added that FRWDB staff had just submitted a proposal to the United States Department of Labor for a Youth Build grant. He noted that it was a hyper competitive procurement, but the FRWDB partnered with Fresno City College; Valley ROP; Fresno, Madera, Kings, Tulare Building Trades Council; Parlier Unified School District; and Habitat for Humanity to submit a strong proposal.

7. **Approval of the December 3, 2025, Meeting Minutes**

SOTIROPULOS/OLIVARES – APPROVED THE DECEMBER 3, 2025, MEETING MINUTES. (UNANIMOUS)

8. **January 2026 Financial Report**

Mr. Konczal presented the January 2026 Financial Report for the FRWDB's acceptance. He reviewed the list of grants that had ended, grants that received an extension, and grants that would be ending March 31, 2026. Director Bonner asked if FRWDB had funding through another grant to meet the supportive service needs previously supported by the ERiCA grant, which ended December 2025. Mr. Konczal indicated that FRWDB was pursuing separate funding; and in the meantime, participants would be co-enrolled so that their supportive services could be covered through formula funding.

Director Hensley asked whether the FRWDB would remain in good standing with funders for grants ending March 31, 2026, that had unspent funds. Mr. Konczal confirmed that FRWDB would remain in good standing with such funders. He indicated, as an example, the High Road Construction Careers grant, where FRWDB staff presented various options to the State to spend down the grant funds that were rejected. This was because the State was working to establish a dedicated line item within the Caltrans budget for HRCC purposes. The State requested FRWDB scale back spending activity until the new funding stream was finalized. The State did allow FRWDB to launch disaster recovery training cohorts at Columbia College, utilizing a portion of the unspent HRCC funds. These cohorts align with AB 1388, mandating prevailing wages for state-funded disaster clean up. FRWDB incorporated safety certifications with its construction training to develop this disaster recovery program. Mr. Konczal noted that FRWDB's demonstrated success with this program will strengthen future funding applications.

OLIVARES/BARNES – ACCEPTED THE JANUARY 2026 FINANCIAL REPORT. (UNANIMOUS)

9. **In the Community - Marketing Update**

Diane Jensen, Senior Marketing Coordinator, FRWDB provided an overview of FRWDB's outreach and marketing efforts and their impact on the community. She reported that FRWDB had an ongoing partnership with Fox 26, where 30-second commercials aired three (3) times daily, Monday through Wednesday. The current commercials featured Young Adult Services and Workforce Connection locations. FRWDB just launched its ValleyBuild commercial, a 30-second spot that runs three (3) times a day on Mondays and Wednesdays, and a 15-second spot on YouTube that is non-skippable. Workforce Spotlights continue to run three (3) times a day on Tuesdays and Thursdays and have a different video each week. Ms. Jensen shared one (1) of the Workforce Spotlights and the 15-second ValleyBuild YouTube commercial with the Board.

Ms. Jensen also reported that FRWDB has a partnership with La Buena radio station, where 30-second Spanish-language ads aired 175 times between December and January, promoting Young Adult Services and later the Career Kickoff event. FRWDB also used Spotify and related platforms for ads, achieving over 500,000 impressions and a 94% completion rate. She noted that the ads included clickable banners that linked to the Workforce Connection website.

She reviewed FRWDB's social media efforts, including regular posts highlighting scholarship recipients, staff spotlight, business testimonials, and community-themed campaigns. She also reported on the placement of ValleyBuild billboards in both English and Spanish in rural areas, including Mendota and Reedley.

Ms. Jensen shared a video featuring the quarter's Adult Business of Excellence Award winner, Fresno and Vicinity Sheet Metal Apprenticeship Training Program.

Ms. Jensen reported that FRWDB participated in 25 events between January 1st and March 5th, and included presentations, career expos, resource fairs, workshops, and participation in upcoming events such as Reedley College job fairs and Career Technical Education showcases. She shared that the Career Kickoff event held in Mendota had 292 job seekers in attendance and had participation from 16 employers, three (3) training providers, and five (5) grant-funded programs. She emphasized the importance of connecting participants to both employment opportunities and training services to support workforce readiness. She shared with the Board about the 30 additional events scheduled through May.

RECOMMENDATION:

Accept the Fresno Regional Workforce Development Board (FRWDB) April 2026 Financial Report.

REASON FOR RECOMMENDATION:

The attached summary financial report and charts display year-to-date financial information through April 30, 2026.

The following grants ended:

- Fatherhood – Health and Human Services: This grant ended September 29, 2025. It was 86.23% expended at \$646,757 with an unspent amount of \$103,242. FRWDB staff have completed the grant closeout with the funder and the remaining balance was *de-obligated*.
- Quality Jobs-Equity-Strategy-Training National Dislocated Worker Grant (QUEST): This grant ended September 30, 2025. It was 94.79% at \$710,909 with an unspent amount of \$39,091. This amount was *de-obligated* with the funder.
- High Road Construction Careers (HRCC) Round 2 – Foundations: This grant ended September 30, 2025. It was 80.96% expended at \$149,780, with an unspent amount of \$35,220. All activities have been completed; one (1) final invoice is pending submission of a published study, which will bring this grant to 100% expended.
- Equal Representation in Construction Apprenticeship (ERiCA): This grant ended December 31, 2025. It was 95.09% expended at \$1,711,624 with an unspent amount of \$88,376. FRWDB staff have completed the grant closeout with the funder and the unspent amount was *returned* to the funder.

The following grants ended March 31, 2026:

- CAL FIRE – Round 2: This grant was 65.27% expended at \$1,288,140 with an unspent amount of \$685,475. FRWDB staff are in the process of completing the grant closeout with the funder and the remaining balance will be *de-obligated*.
- High Road Construction Careers - Resilient Workforce Fund (HRCC – RWF): This grant was 80.78% expended at \$7,128,993, with an unspent amount of \$1,696,134. FRWDB staff are in the process of completing the grant closeout with the funder and the remaining balance will be *de-obligated*.

- High Road Training Partnerships – Resilient Workforce Fund (HRTF – RWF): This grant was 93.82% expended at \$2,345,562 with an unspent amount of \$154,438. FRWDB staff are in the process of completing the grant closeout with the funder and the remaining balance will be *de-obligated*.
- Aspen Institute: This grant was 95.84% expended at \$47,922 with an unspent amount of \$2,078. FRWDB staff are in the process of completing the grant closeout with the funder and the remaining balance will be *de-obligated*.
- High Road Training Partnerships – CA Legacy Well Services: As of January 31, 2026, this grant was 100% expended at \$40,000.

The following grants will end June 30, 2026:

- ValleyBuild Earmark: This grant is 83.50% expended at \$2,504,984, with an unspent amount of \$495,016. FRWDB staff anticipate this grant will be 100% expended.
- Prison to Employment (P2E) 2.0: This grant is 94.18% expended at \$535,539, with an unspent amount of \$33,097. FRWDB staff anticipate this grant will be 100% expended.

Staff have no concerns with other grant expenditures.

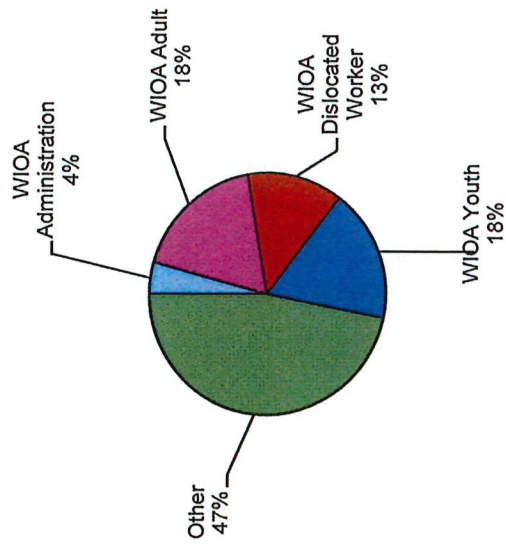

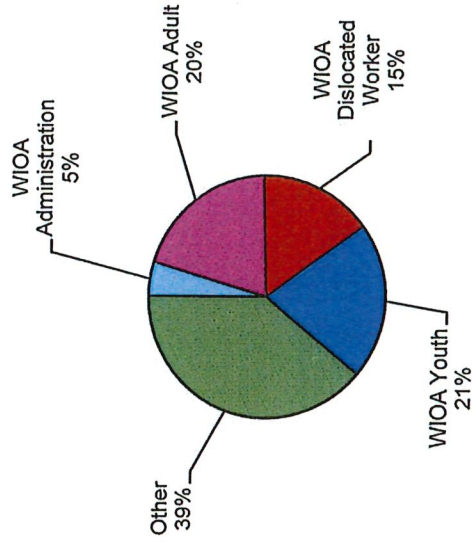

Approve the Workforce Innovation and Opportunity Act (WIOA) Adult and Dislocated Worker service provider contract awards for Program Year 2026-2027, as outlined below.

This item will be submitted to the Adult Council on May 28, 2026, and the results of the Adult Council meeting will be reported at the Fresno Regional Workforce Development Board's (FRWDB's) June 3, 2026, meeting.

REASON FOR RECOMMENDATION:

Under the FRWDB Procurement Policy, contracts must be procured at least once every five (5) years. The current WIOA Adult and Dislocated Worker service contracts are set to expire on June 30, 2026. To ensure the continuation of services, staff began the procurement process for Adult and Dislocated Worker services to have new contracts in place by July 1, 2026.

In anticipation of changes to federal regulations associated with the WIOA reauthorization, senior staff drafted a Hybrid Service Model for Adult and Dislocated Worker services. This model establishes a more efficient operating approach by moving Basic Career Services and Job Readiness Workshops under FRWDB staff while contracting out Individualized Career Services to subrecipients. The Executive Committee approved the new service model at its January 21, 2026, meeting and authorized staff to release the Request for Proposals (RFP) for Adult and Dislocated Worker services.

Staff released separate RFPs for Adult and Dislocated Worker services on March 2, 2026, and a bidders' conference was held on March 10, 2026. The submission deadline for proposals was March 31, 2026. Three (3) proposals were submitted for Adult services, and two (2) proposals were submitted for Dislocated Worker services prior to the deadline.

All proposals were reviewed by staff and met the minimum RFP criteria and were forwarded to the evaluation team, which met on April 20, 2026, to conduct its review. Each proposal achieved the required minimum score of 70 points to be considered for award.

In consultation with the Evaluation Team, staff is recommending the following contract awards: Adult services to Equus Workforce Solutions, the current provider, and Dislocated Worker services to Central Labor Council Partnership, also the current provider, for an initial term of July 1, 2026, to June 30, 2027, with the option to renew for four (4) additional years based on performance. A copy of the Evaluation Summary Worksheet is attached for your review.

RECOMMENDATION:

Approve Workforce Innovation and Opportunity Act (WIOA) Adult and Dislocated Worker funding allocations for Program Year (PY) 2026-2027 as outlined in the attached budget allocation worksheet (Attachment I).

This item will be submitted to the Adult Council on May 28, 2026, and the results of the Adult Council meeting will be reported at the Fresno Regional Workforce Development Board's (FRWDB's) June 3, 2026, meeting.

REASON FOR RECOMMENDATION:

The Employment Development Department (EDD), Workforce Services Division, released WIOA Formula Planning Allocations on May 15, 2026 (Attachment II). These allocations are based on the allotments issued by the U.S. Department of Labor (DOL), Employment and Training Administration to the states on April 28, 2026.

Once Fresno Regional Workforce Development Board (FRWDB) staff has completed the final reconciliation of the PY 2025-2026 carryover, FRWDB staff will bring the revised funding recommendations to the October 22, 2026, Adult Council meeting.

The FRWDB received an award of \$12,468,662 for Adult and Dislocated Worker funds, an overall increase of \$484,737, or 4.04% compared to last year's allocation of \$11,983,925. The projected carryover for the WIOA Adult and Dislocated Worker program is estimated at \$2,434,998, which is a decrease of \$746,598, or a reduction of 23.47% compared to \$3,181,595 for PY 2025-2026. This brings the total available funding to \$14,903,660, which results in an overall net decrease of \$261,861, or a reduction of 1.73%, for PY 2026-2027.

FRWDB staff recommends that the Adult Council approve the proposed budget allocations as outlined in Column D of Attachment I. Approval of the recommended funding allocations will result in the following:

- Maintain a 3% carryover to PY 2027-2028;
- \$148,048 decrease in America's Job Centers of California Facility/Site Budgets;
- \$16,966 increase in Community Outreach/Marketing Budget;
- \$1,762,884 net increase in FRWDB Admin Support, Program Support and FRWDB Basic Career Services;

- Maintain the 30% training requirement of the total award for mandated training, for PY 2026-2027. All training funds are allocated to the current PY Training and Incument Worker Training (IWT) pools;
- \$220,884 decrease in Dislocated Worker services' contract due to moving Basic Career Services and Job Readiness Workshops under FRWDB staff;
- \$624,514 decrease in Adult services' contract due to moving Basic Career Services and Job Readiness Workshops under FRWDB staff;
- \$885,098 decrease, due to expenditures in Prior Plan Year Training Reserve
- \$200,000 decrease in IWT Pool;
- \$30,000 decrease in Supportive Services;
- \$100,000 decrease to Participant Soft Skills Workshop pool
- \$10,000 decrease to Public Defenders Project.

FISCAL IMPACT:

Approval of this item will allocate \$14,903,660 of WIOA Adult and Dislocated Worker funds, which will be allocated to FRWDB operational, sub-contracts and participant pools.

WIOA Formula Allocations – PY 26-27

Workforce Services Information Notice WSIN25-32

Issued: May 15, 2026

The *Workforce Innovation and Opportunity Act* (WIOA) Title I formula fund allocations for each Local Workforce Development Area (Local Area) for Program Year (PY) 2026-27, have been released. These allocations—for the Adult, Youth, and Dislocated Worker (DW) programs—are based on the allotments issued by the U.S. Department of Labor (DOL), to the states via [Training and Employment Guidance Letter 10-25 \(https://www.dol.gov/agencies/eta/advisories/tegl-10-25\)](https://www.dol.gov/agencies/eta/advisories/tegl-10-25) (TEGL) dated April 28, 2026.

The WIOA prescribes a specific method for calculating sub-state hold harmless levels for DW Program funds. As a result, there is alignment in the hold harmless provisions across the Youth, Adult, and DW programs. These provisions were established to help mitigate year-to-year funding volatility. Under WIOA, hold harmless provisions ensure that each area receives **no less than 90 percent** of their average percentage share from the two prior years. Local Areas that would otherwise receive **more than 100 percent** of their average percentage share from the previous two years will be proportionately reduced to ensure that all local areas receive at least 90 percent.

This notice is being issued for planning and budgeting purposes only because the state has not yet received the federal Notice of Award (NOA) for any of the funding streams. Once the NOA has been received:

- Youth allocations will be released to Local Areas immediately. These will be issued in one sum with an effective date of April 1, 2026, under the grant code 301.
- Adult and DW allocations will be released as soon as both federal and state spending authority is received.

The allotment to California and the amounts available for the formula allocation to the Local Areas are listed below. Attachment 1 reflects the total amount Local Areas will receive for each of the funding streams during the PY 26-27. Additionally, Attachment 2 provides a breakdown of how each of the three funding streams are allocated.

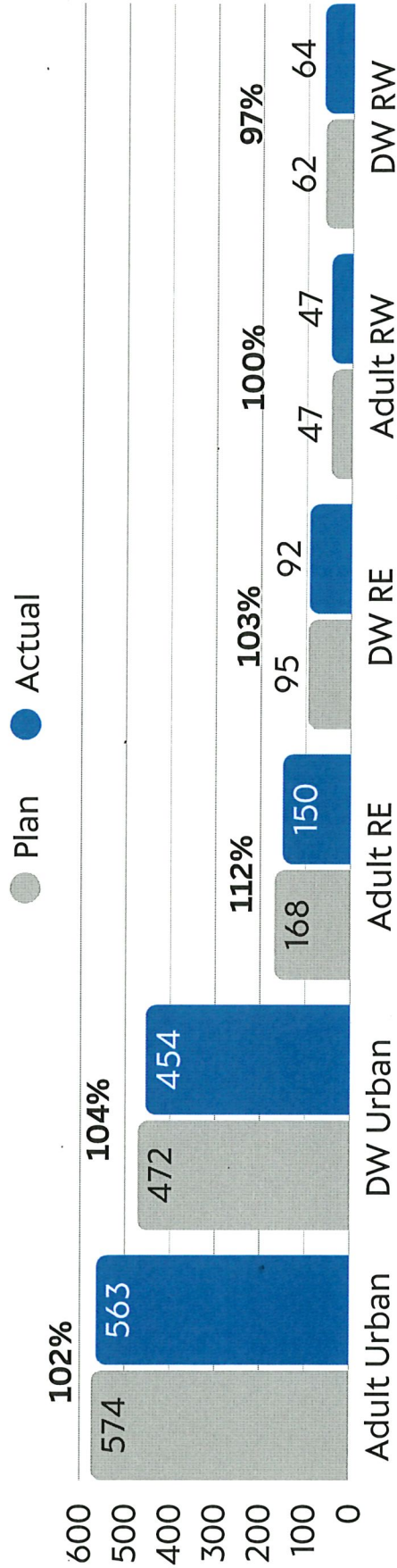
Program Year 2025-2026, Q3 Year-to-Date – Adult/DW Local KRAs

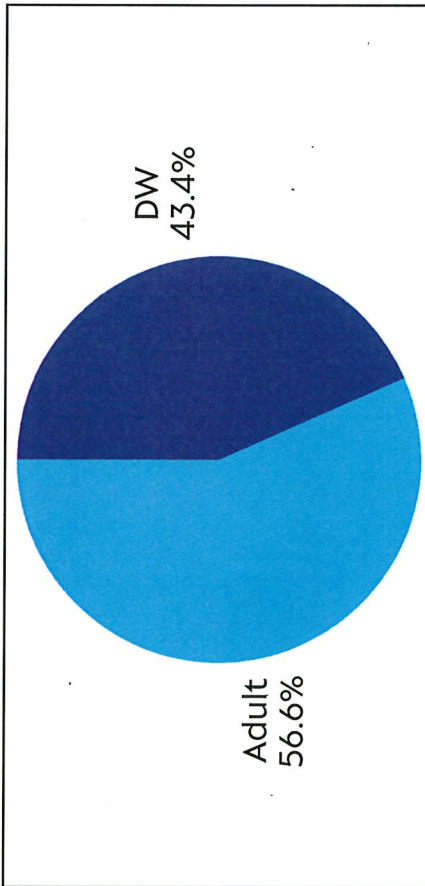

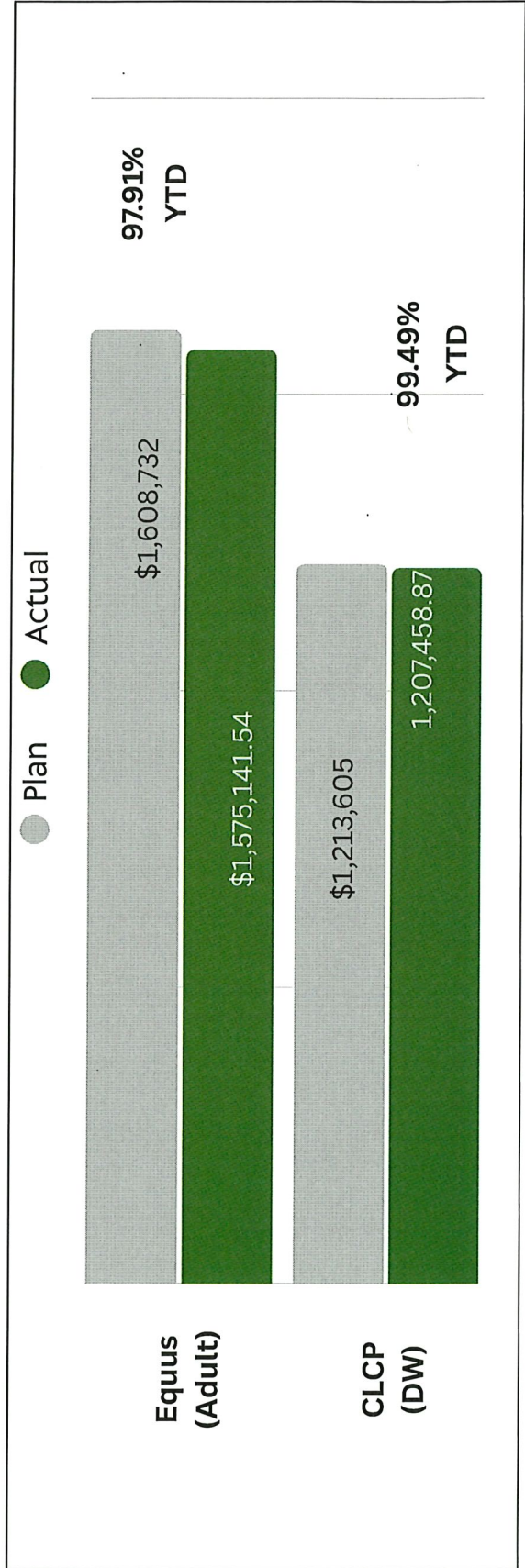
PROGRAM YEAR 2025-2026, Q3 YEAR-TO-DATE - ADULT/DW LOCAL KRAS

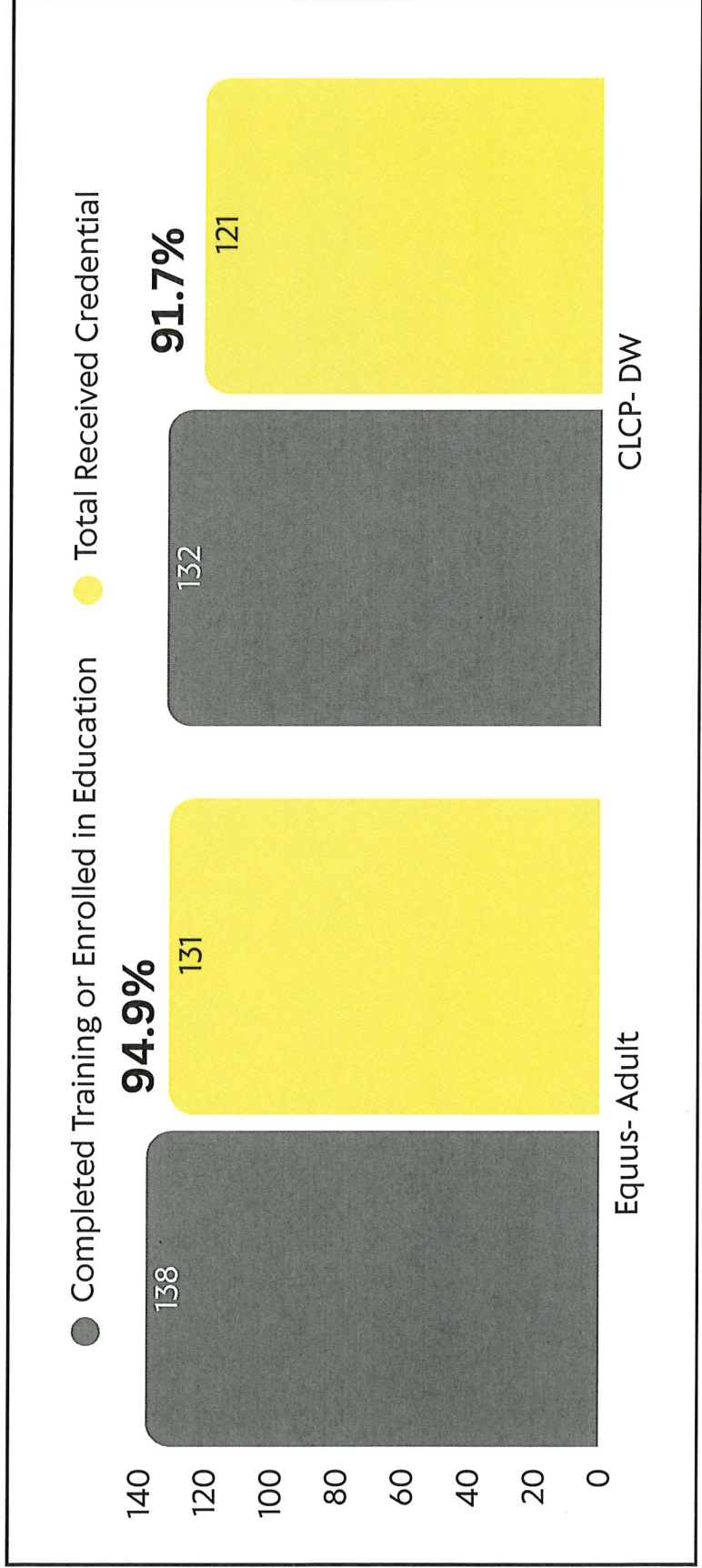

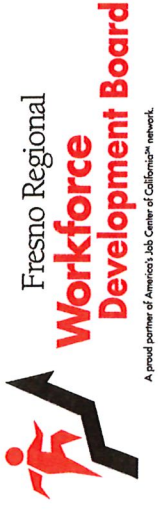

RECOMMENDATION:

Approve Workforce Innovation and Opportunity Act (WIOA) Youth funding allocations for Program Year (PY) 2026-2027 as outlined in the attached budget allocation worksheet (Attachment I).

The Youth Council approved this recommendation on May 21, 2026.

REASON FOR RECOMMENDATION:

The Employment Development Department (EDD), Workforce Services Division, released WIOA Formula Planning Allocations on May 15, 2026 (Attachment II). These allocations are based on the allotments issued by the U.S. Department of Labor (DOL), Employment and Training Administration to the states on April 28, 2026.

Once Fresno Regional Workforce Development Board (FRWDB) staff has completed the final reconciliation of the PY 2025-2026 carryover, FRWDB staff will bring the revised funding recommendations to the November 19, 2026, Youth Council meeting.

The FRWDB received an award of \$6,192,205 for Youth funds, an overall decrease of \$796,046, or reduction of 11.39% compared to last year's allocation of \$6,988,051. The projected carryover for the WIOA Youth program is estimated at \$1,319,009, which is a decrease of \$1,023,622, or reduction of 43.70% compared to \$2,342,631 for PY 2025-2026. This brings the total available funding to \$7,511,014, which results in an overall estimated net decrease of \$1,819,668, or a reduction of 19.50%, for PY 2026-2027.

FRWDB staff recommends that the Youth Council approve the proposed budget allocations as outlined in Column D of Attachment I. Approval of the recommended funding allocations will result in the following:

- Maintain a 3% carryover to PY 2027-2028;
- Allocate 20% of total award for Work Experience training as mandated by the Department of Labor;
- \$259,452 decrease in America's Job Centers of California Facility/Site Budgets;
- \$15,921 decrease in Community Outreach/Marketing Budget;
- \$183,493 net increase in FRWDB Admin and Program Support;
- 5% decrease to Providers of Services' contracts;

- \$143,288 decrease in Current Plan Year Work Experience Pool;
- \$1,196,172 decrease, due to expenditures in Prior Plan Year Work Experience Reserve;
- \$180,689 decrease in Vocational Training Pool;
- \$60,000 decrease in Supportive Services.

FISCAL IMPACT:

Approval of this item will allocate \$7,511,014 of WIOA Youth funds, which will be allocated to FRWDB operational, sub-contracts and participant pools.

WIOA Formula Allocations – PY 26-27

Workforce Services Information Notice WSIN25-32

Issued: May 15, 2026

The *Workforce Innovation and Opportunity Act* (WIOA) Title I formula fund allocations for each Local Workforce Development Area (Local Area) for Program Year (PY) 2026-27, have been released. These allocations—for the Adult, Youth, and Dislocated Worker (DW) programs—are based on the allotments issued by the U.S. Department of Labor (DOL), to the states via [Training and Employment Guidance Letter 10-25](https://www.dol.gov/agencies/eta/advisories/tegl-10-25) (<https://www.dol.gov/agencies/eta/advisories/tegl-10-25>) (TEGL) dated April 28, 2026.

The WIOA prescribes a specific method for calculating sub-state hold harmless levels for DW Program funds. As a result, there is alignment in the hold harmless provisions across the Youth, Adult, and DW programs. These provisions were established to help mitigate year-to-year funding volatility. Under WIOA, hold harmless provisions ensure that each area receives **no less than 90 percent** of their average percentage share from the two prior years. Local Areas that would otherwise receive **more than 100 percent** of their average percentage share from the previous two years will be proportionately reduced to ensure that all local areas receive at least 90 percent.

This notice is being issued for planning and budgeting purposes only because the state has not yet received the federal Notice of Award (NOA) for any of the funding streams. Once the NOA has been received:

- Youth allocations will be released to Local Areas immediately. These will be issued in one sum with an effective date of April 1, 2026, under the grant code 301.
- Adult and DW allocations will be released as soon as both federal and state spending authority is received.

The allotment to California and the amounts available for the formula allocation to the Local Areas are listed below. Attachment 1 reflects the total amount Local Areas will receive for each of the funding streams during the PY 26-27. Additionally, Attachment 2 provides a breakdown of how each of the three funding streams are allocated.

RECOMMENDATION:

Approve a contract extension and additional funding to Equus Workforce Solutions (EWS) to continue providing services under the One Fresno Youth Job Corps Program (YJCP) from June 1, 2026, through December 31, 2026, in the amount of \$108,663.15. The current contract term with EWS ends May 31, 2026. With this extension, the total award allocation from the City of Fresno will increase to \$391,933.09, as outlined below.

The Youth Council approved this recommendation on May 21, 2026.

REASON FOR RECOMMENDATION:

EWS is requesting a contract extension of the YJCP program through December 2026, to ensure continuity of services, maximize participant outcomes, and fully achieve the program’s intended impact. This extension will allow EWS to serve additional youth while providing currently enrolled participants with the time and support needed as they complete internships, transition into employment, and sustain long term success.

EWS has demonstrated the ability to deliver effective services, and extending the timeline will maximize impact. Due to the longer performance period, additional funding is required to sustain operations under the current cost allocation structure.

Fresno Regional Workforce Development Board staff recommends approval of the contract extension to December 31, 2026, and the additional funding allocation to ensure continuity of services, support participant completion, and achieve the intended program outcomes.

The data is then aggregated, analyzed, and reviewed quarterly, and the findings are presented to this Council for review.

FRWDB staff continue to collaborate with service providers to improve processes that enhance young adult participant satisfaction. These improvements are based on data collected through satisfaction surveys, monitoring reviews, complaints, and monthly operations meetings between providers and FRWDB staff.

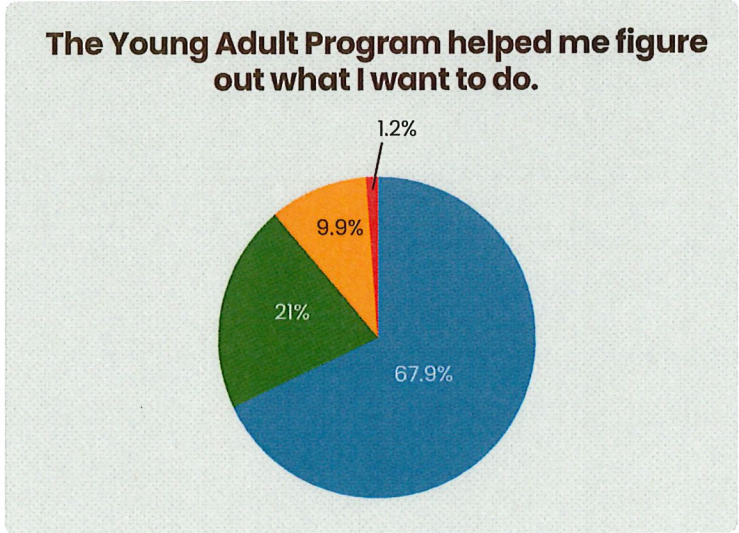
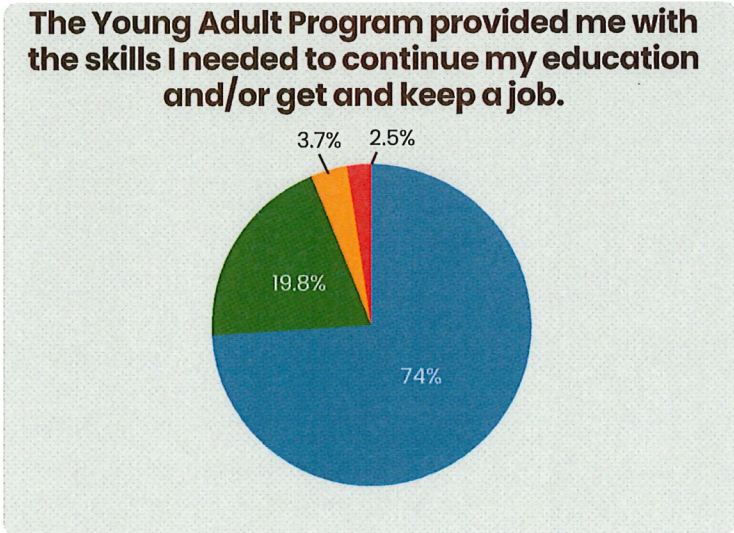
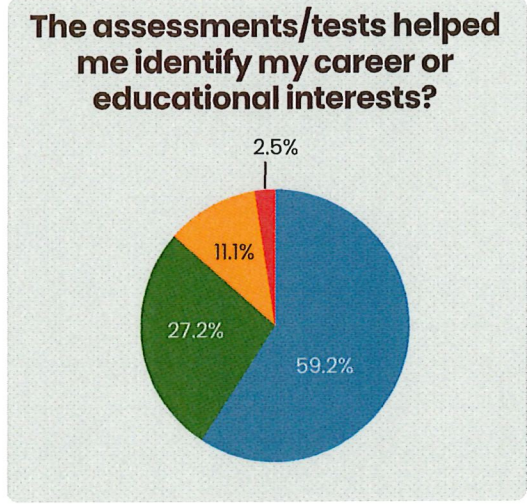
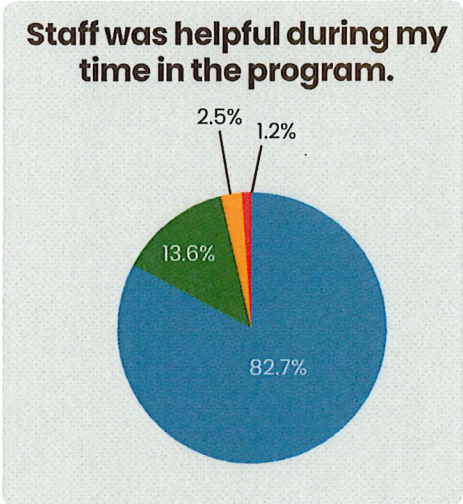
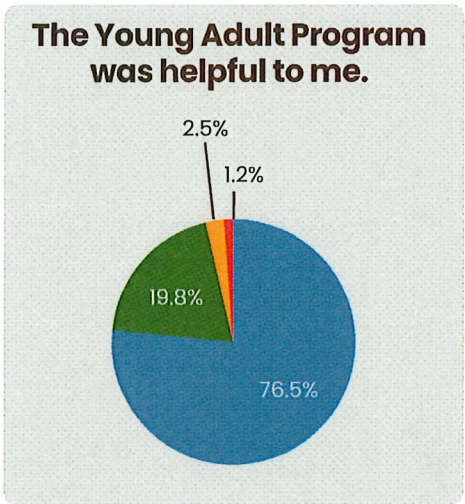

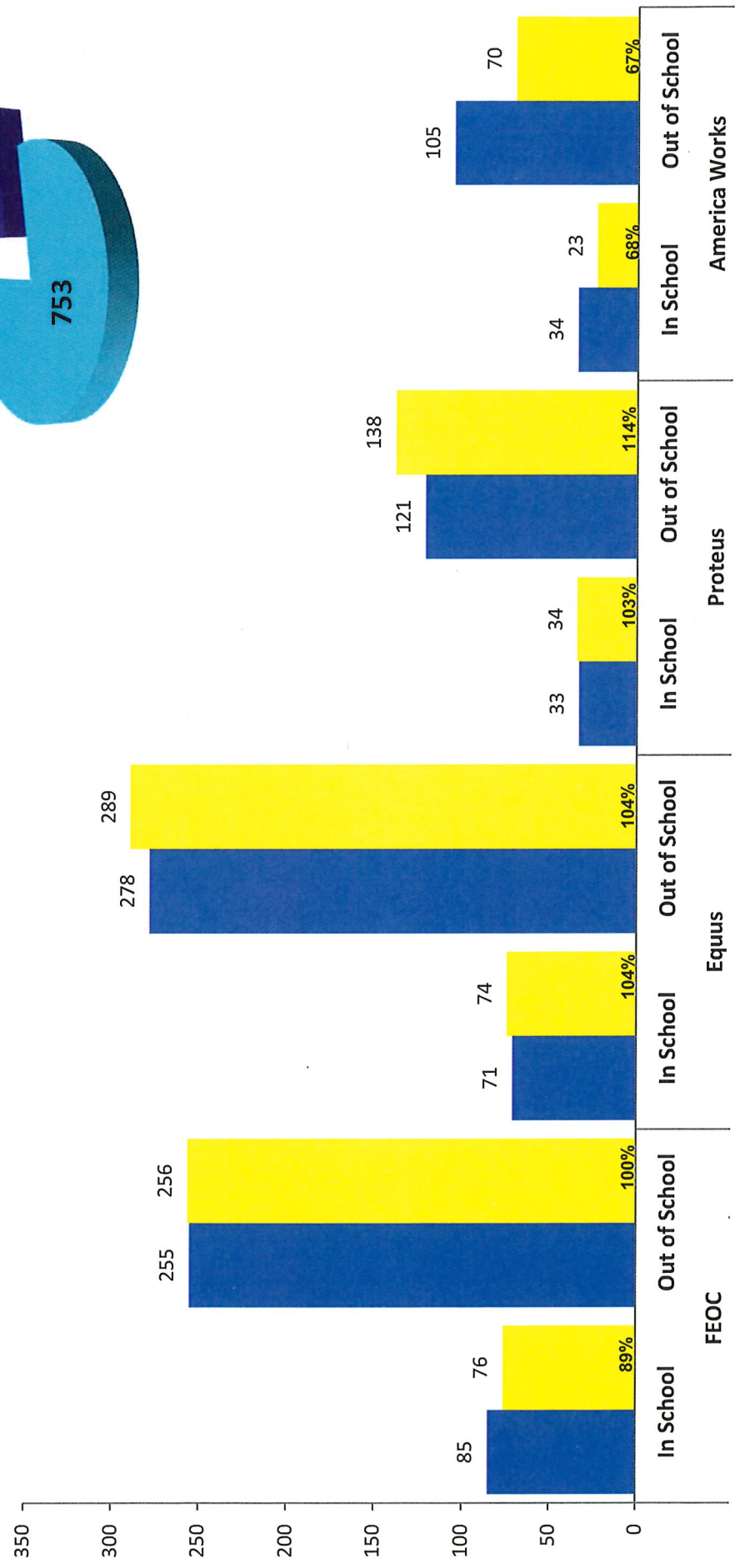

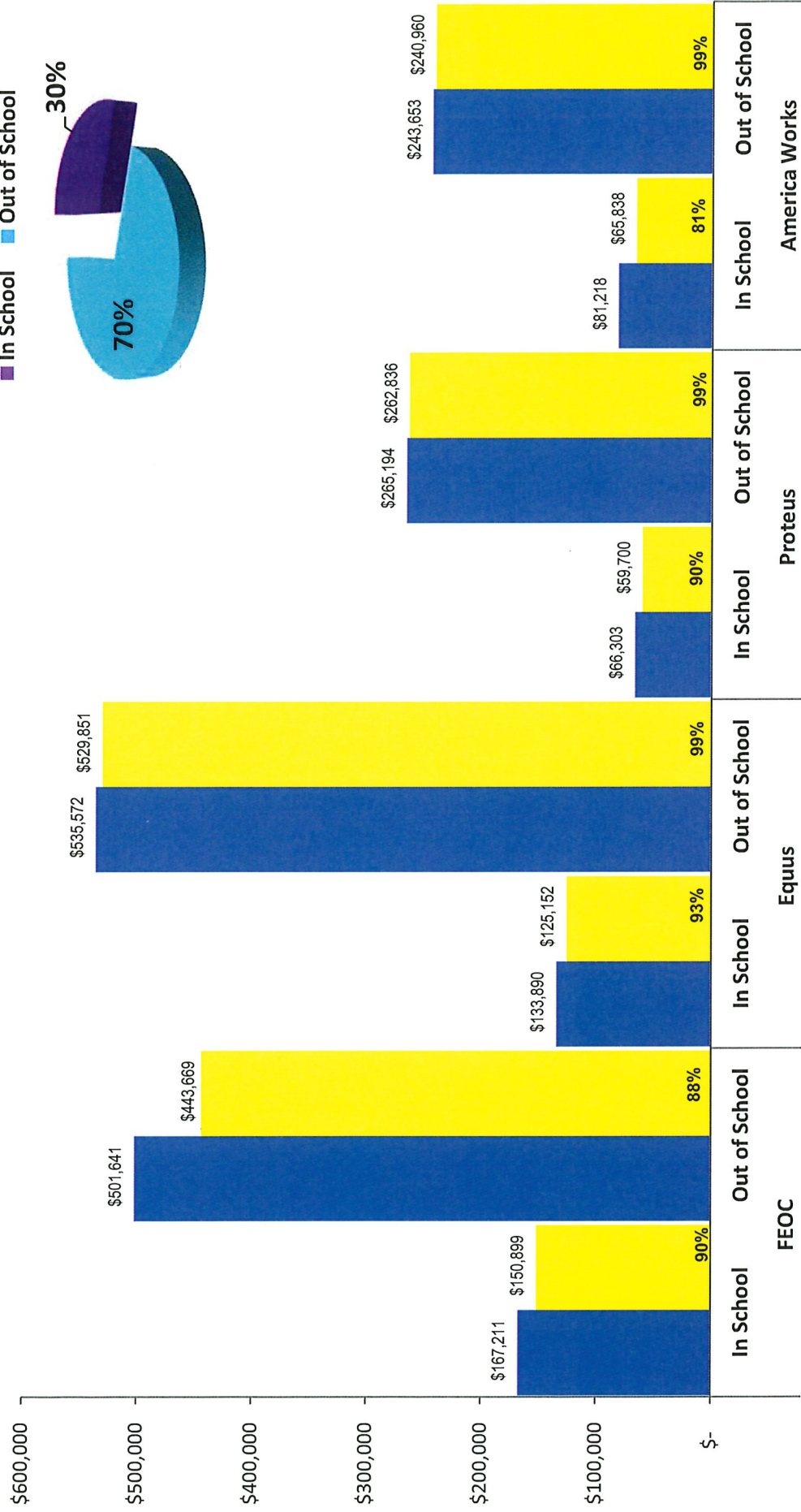

Youth Expenditures



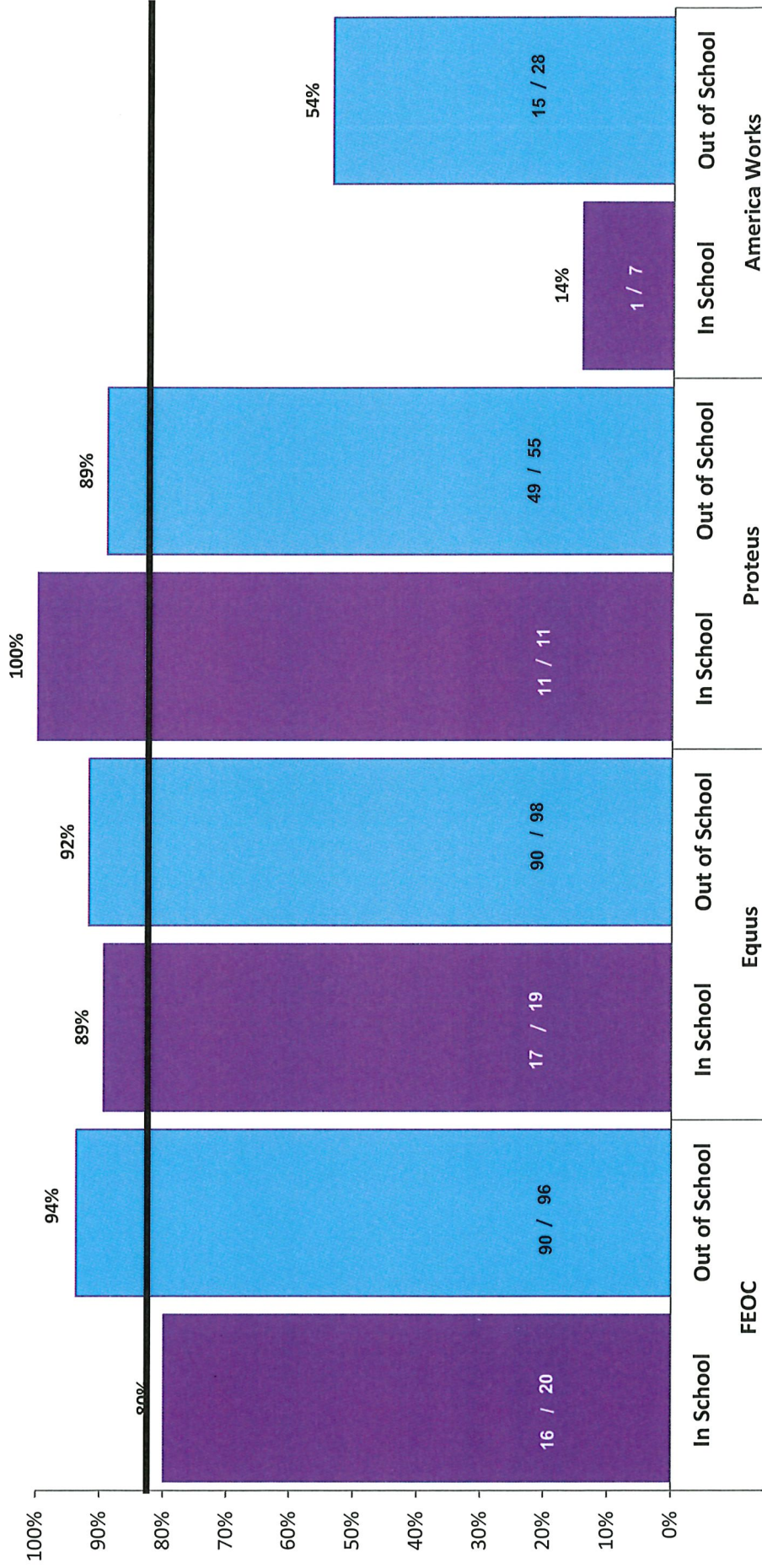

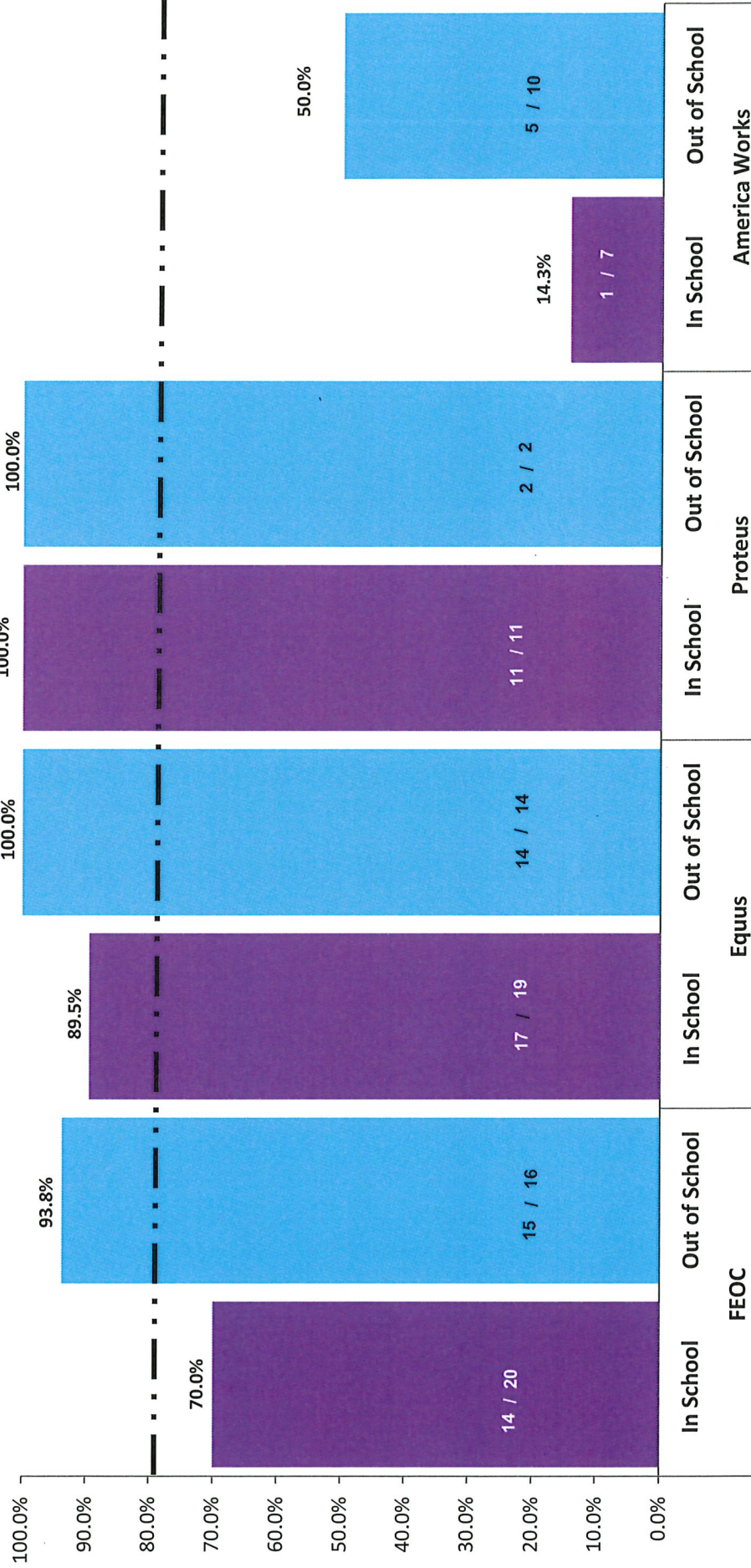

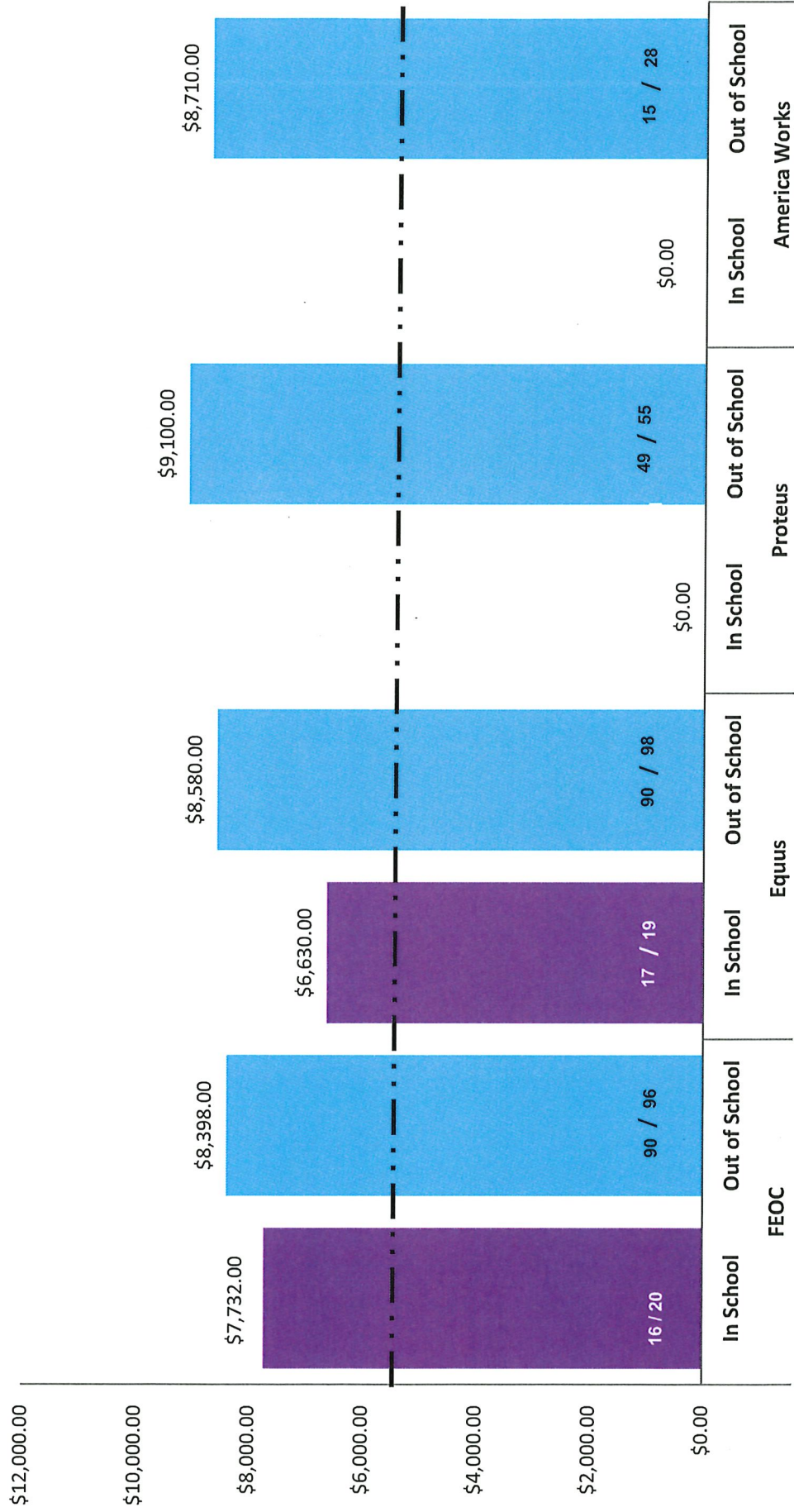

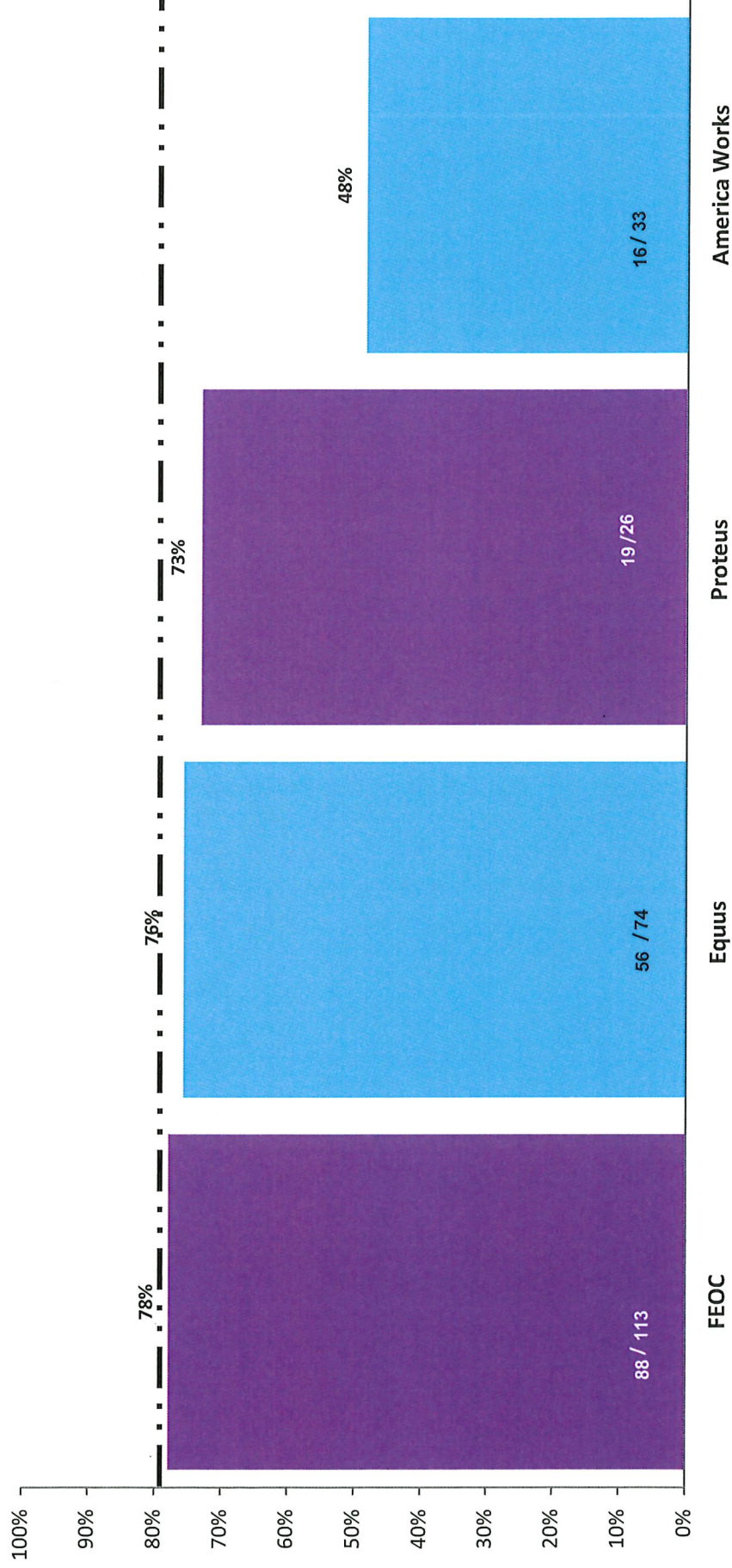
